CHARACTERISTICS

Height: 10 – 20'

Width: 10 – 20'

Identification: Commonly called southern black haw, rusty black haw or rusty nannyberry, is a deciduous, suckering shrub or small tree that typically grows 10-20' tall. It is native from Virginia to Florida west to Kansas and Texas, including Missouri where it typically occurs in rocky or dry woods, valleys, rocky glades, thickets and along streams. Showy Blooms



GROWING CONDITIONS

Native Habitat: Southeastern United States

Water: Medium to wet

Sun Light: Full sun or part shade

BENEFITS

Tiny white flowers in showy rounded cymes (to 5" across) bloom in spring. Flowers are followed by clusters of elliptic, edible, dark blue berries (to 3/8" long) that ripen in September-October. Birds are attracted to the fruit. Foliage turns reddish purple in fall.
