City Attorney

Garnishment Actions – Eight responses, answers to interrogatories or other pleadings in garnishment actions were filed this quarter.

Bankruptcy – The City Attorney's Office filed no Proof of Claims in bankruptcies involving the City.

John LaTour v. City of Fayetteville, et. al. – United States District Court # 02-5001. Mr. LaTour sued the City, the City Attorney, City Prosecutor, Assistant City Prosecutor, one of the Planning Commission members, and a City Sign Inspector for enforcing the sign ordinance and prosecuting Mr. LaTour. The Court dismissed all personal liability claims and the ten million dollar claim for punitive damages as well as Mr. LaTour's claim we discriminated against him. Mr. LaTour appealed to the Eighth Circuit Court of Appeals. **The Eighth Circuit affirmed the City's victory and denied Mr. LaTour's request for a rehearing.** Mr. LaTour has begun the steps to request *certiorari* to the U.S. Supreme Court which has taken no action on his request to our knowledge for years.

City of Fayetteville v. Thornton, CV 08-3029-4 – Ms. Thornton was the only property owner along the Scull Creek Trail corridor who refused to grant the City an easement. Ms. Thornton did not complain about the money, but wanted additional access onto Gregg Street which the UDC would not allow. The Assistant City Attorney obtained an Order of Possession so the Scull Creek trail could be completed on schedule. Ms. Thornton is obtaining her own appraisal for a counteroffer. The case is scheduled for trial on September 20, 2009.

Burton Properties, LLC v. City of Johnson and Tracy Hoskins – Case No. 2008-412-5 – On November 18, 2008, Defendant Tracy Hoskins moved the Court to allow him to file a Third Party Complaint against the City of Fayetteville in this property dispute case. The City Attorney responded to the parties with documentation that the City could not be liable as it had received warranty deeds from plaintiff's predecessors in title which would defeat any claims by plaintiff against the City. Staff also pointed to the statutory prohibition against asserting adverse possession against a city. Since no complaint has been served against the City of Fayetteville, staff assumes the evidence and argument have successfully prevented the City from being dragged into this suit as another defendant.

Unfortunately, Mr. Hoskins did file a Third Party Complaint against the City in January and attempted service in February leaving only two months for discovery and pretrial motions after the City filed its Answer. The City Attorney immediately sought a continuance of the April 27, 2009 trial date and filed a hurried Motion for Summary Judgment on March 13, 2009, before receiving any discovery responses. The City Attorney has filed four sets of Requests For Admission and three sets of Written Interrogatories and Requests for Production of Documents. The City Attorney also filed a Response to Motion For Continuance with Brief when Mr. Hoskins objected to the City's Motion For Continuance. The Circuit Judge granted a continuance until August 18, 2009. Both of the other parties filed cross-motions for Summary Judgment and the City Attorney responded with replies and supporting brief. All Motions For Summary Judgment were argued before Judge Mashburn on June 24, 2009, but no decision has yet been rendered.

City of Fayetteville v. Watson et al – CV 2009-2087-4 – Mt. Comfort Road Widening Project condemnation case in Washington County Circuit Court. The case is filed and awaiting Return of Service.

City of Fayetteville v. Tobin Revocable Trust – CV 2009-2086-4 – Township Street Widening Project condemnation case in Washington County Circuit Court. The case is filed and Return of Service is complete.

David and Quida Hill v. Board of Adjustment – CV 2009-408-9 – Mr. Hill has filed his Notice of Appeal and Designation of Record in this appeal of the Board of Adjustment's denial of his request for variances from setback requirements in the HHOD. This case is set for jury trial on October 26, 2009.

Bunch v. Hoyt, Riley, Grammar, Moad, Reed, Krause, Coy and Macri – Federal District Court Case No. 06-5220 – Mr. Bunch was apprehended by Fayetteville Police Officers after stealing methamphetamine component drugs from Wal-Mart, shooting at a Wal-Mart employee and later at a Fayetteville Police Officer. Mr. Bunch resisted arrest and kicked an officer before he could be subdued and placed into a police car. Mr. Bunch was convicted and received a long prison sentence (current address is Arkansas Department of Corrections at Grady, AR). He claimed ineffective assistance by counsel, but his Rule 37 petition was denied by Judge Storey in August, 2006. Mr. Bunch claims excessive force was used in his arrest. Defense counsel Brian Wood filed a Motion for Summary Judgment. The Court denied the Motion for Summary Judgment. An evidentiary hearing was held on February 26, 2009, before the magistrate. **The Magistrate Judge recommended that the District Judge dismiss Mr. Bunch's case with prejudice** following the evidentiary hearing because Mr. Bunch's "evidence" was legally insufficient to withstand our motion for summary judgment. Mr. Bunch has objected to the Magistrate's Report and Recommendation. Judge Hendren should decide whether to accept Magistrate Judge Marschewski's Report and Recommendation in the near future. **Judge Hendren accepted** Magistrate Judge Marschewski's Report and Recommendation **and dismissed Mr. Bunch's case with prejudice**. Mr. Bunch may appeal his loss.

Michael Benjamin v. Officer Sean Chandler, Mayor Dan Coody and Sheriff Tim Helder – Federal District Court Case No. 08-5134 – Mr. Benjamin was arrested by Officer Sean Chandler who discovered a loaded handgun in Mr. Benjamin's car (after a consensual search) following a 911 call about a man threatening another with a gun. Drugs were found on Mr. Chandler when he was being placed in jail. Mr. Chandler admitted pointing the loaded gun at the victim and received a long prison sentence.

All of his claims against Mr. Coody and Sheriff Helder have been dismissed, and all claims against Officer Chandler have been dismissed except his allegation of an illegal search. We believe Officer Chandler obtained a valid consent (even if Benjamin now regrets giving this consent). If he had not received this consent, Officer Chandler had enough probable cause (witness and victim's statements) to arrest Benjamin and then search his car incident to the arrest. The Bassett firm is representing the City through our policy with AIG.

Mark Waller v. Greg Tabor, Case No. CV 2009-1189-6 – Mark Waller (awaiting trial on criminal charges) presented the Police Department a letter addressed to Greg Tabor, Chief requesting documents pursuant to the Freedom of Information Act on April 10, 2009, after Chief Tabor had left for the weekend. Chief Tabor received the letter on April 13th and was able to e-mail Mr. Waller by April 14th that all non-exempt documents for which Chief Tabor was the custodian were ready to be picked up. On April 15, 2009, Mr. Waller sued Chief Tabor and wrongfully alleged that: "None of the requested public records were made available to Plaintiff."

No summons was obtained by Mr. Waller or his attorney until May 19, 2009. Greg Tabor was served on May 20, 2009. The City Attorney filed an answer for Greg Tabor on May 22, 2009 asserting Greg Tabor had properly complied with the FOIA. On June 11, 2009, the City Attorney filed a Motion For Summary Judgment and Supporting Brief seeking a complete dismissal of this case. Mr. Waller has yet to respond or answer the Motion For Summary Judgment.

Library

Louise Schaper, Executive Director, announced a retirement date of October 30, 2009. The FPL Board of Trustees formed a search committee, sought stakeholder input, advertised the position, and began receiving applications.

Meyer, Scherer & Rockcastle LTD conducted a space study May 13-18 including stakeholder input.

Hired Susan Foley as Director of Development to head fundraising efforts with a key focus on the NEH Challenge Grant. Check outs continued to increase, up over 4% for the year with the greatest increase in the teen collection.

Unveiled the manhole cover designed by Hank Kaminsky and donated by Hershey and Denise Garner.

Created FPL twitter account, Fayetteville401.

Completed the Reading Roadshow, a volunteer run outreach program, for the school year and distributed 238 new hardbound books to participating children.

The FPL received notice of a \$35,000 grant from Wal-Mart/Sam's Club Foundation to the FPL Foundation for summer reading programs. Staff visited all the Fayetteville schools to promote summer reading programs, shared summer reading program advertising expenses with the Bentonville and Rogers public libraries, and completed tours of the Blair Library for 800 kindergarten children.

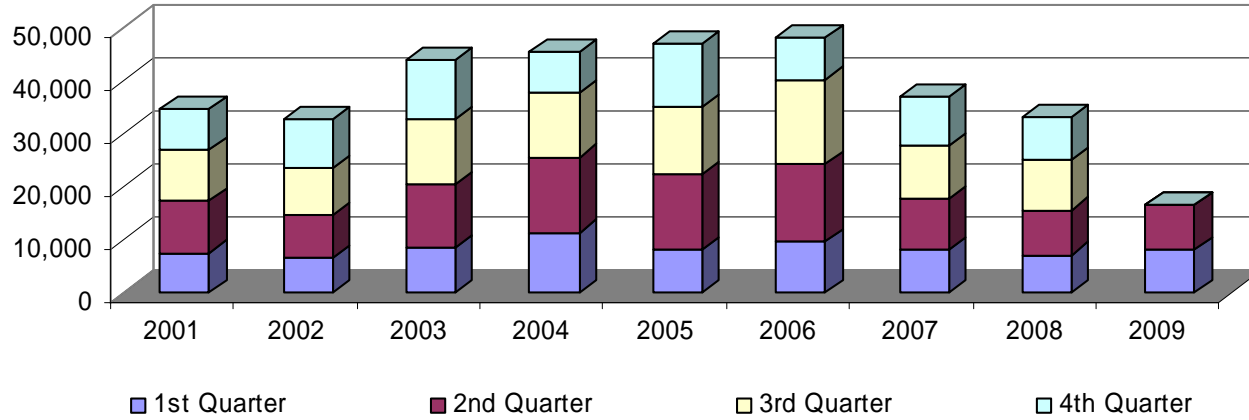
Staff implemented reciprocal borrowing with the Bentonville Public Library.

The FPL was named "best of the best library in NWA" by the AR Democrat Gazette's recent poll.

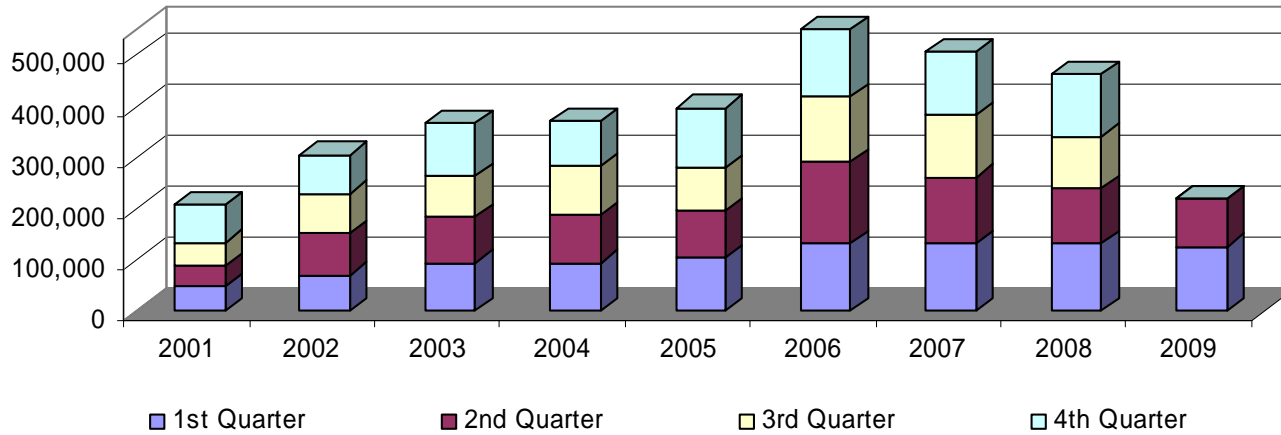

Quarterly Comparisons of Aircraft Operations Counted by Tower

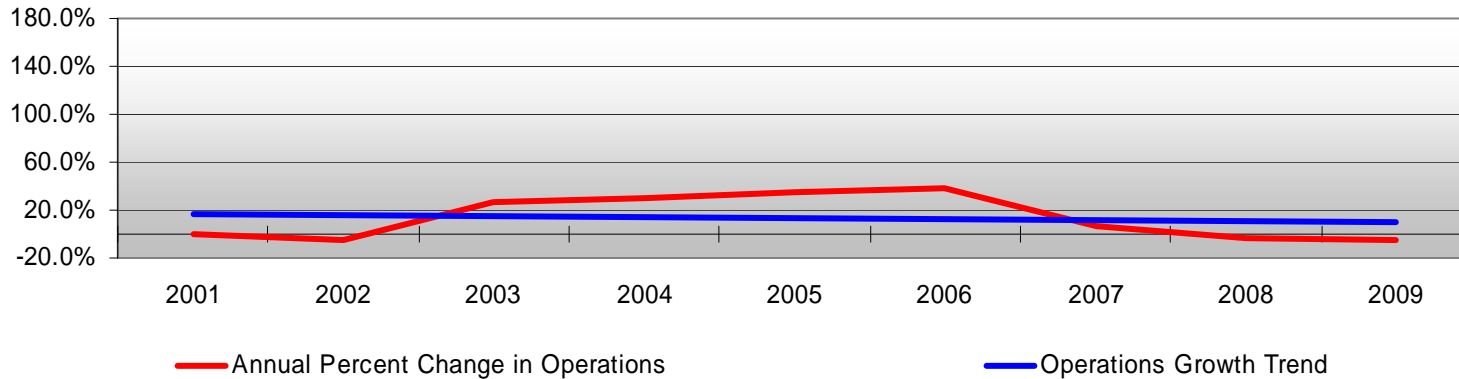


Quarterly Comparison - Fuel Sales Volume



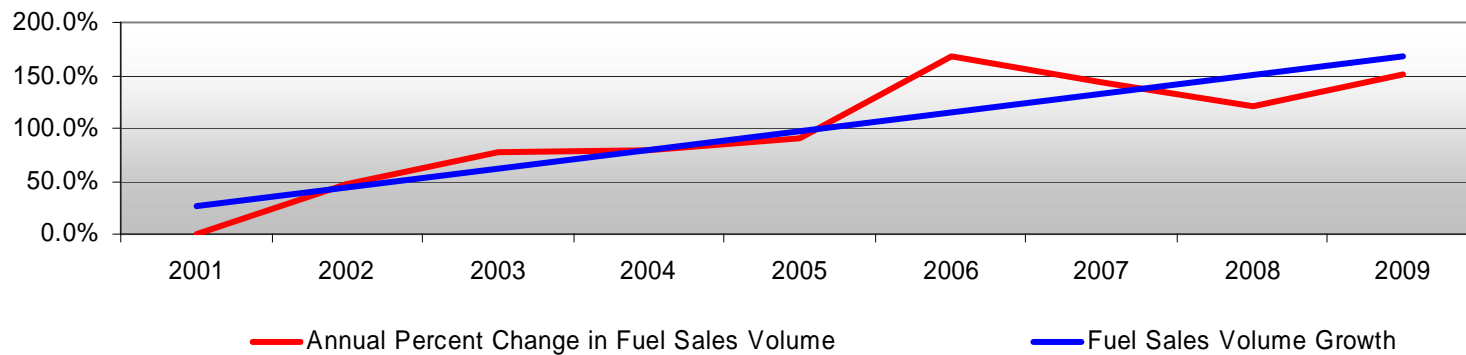

Annual Percent Change in Fuel Sales Volume - Base Year 2001

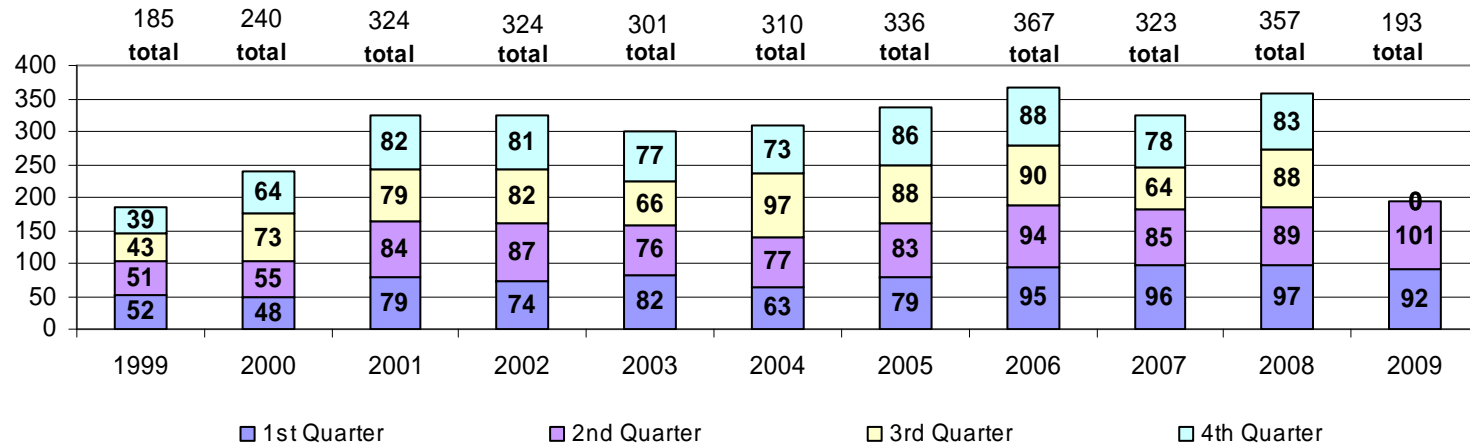

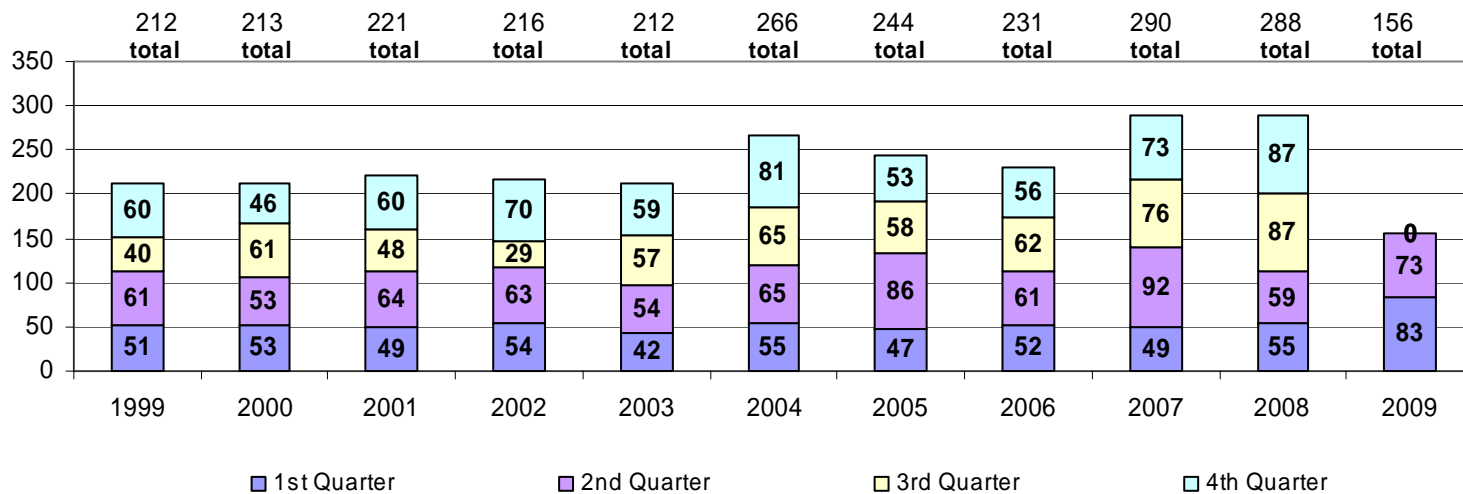

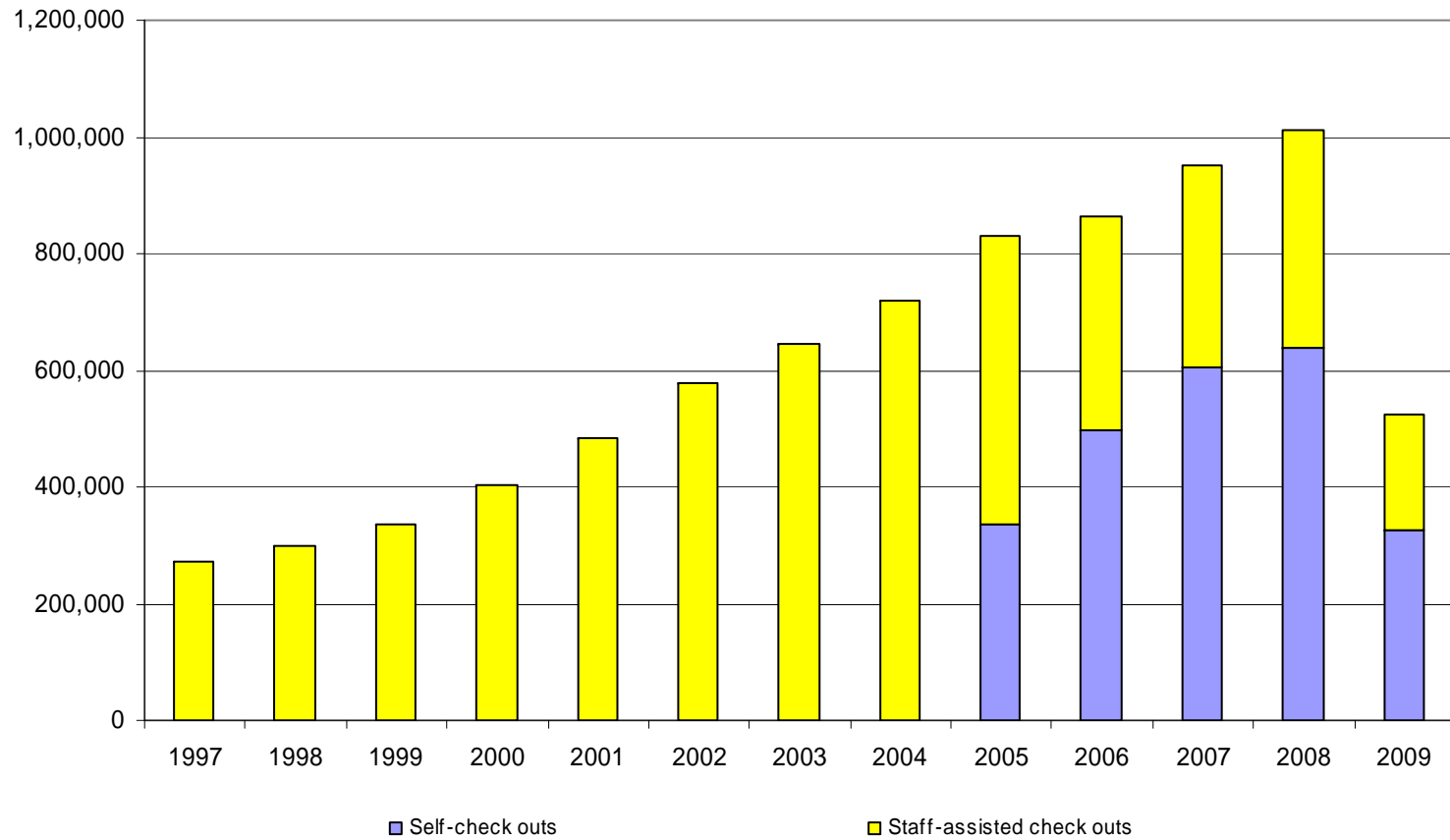

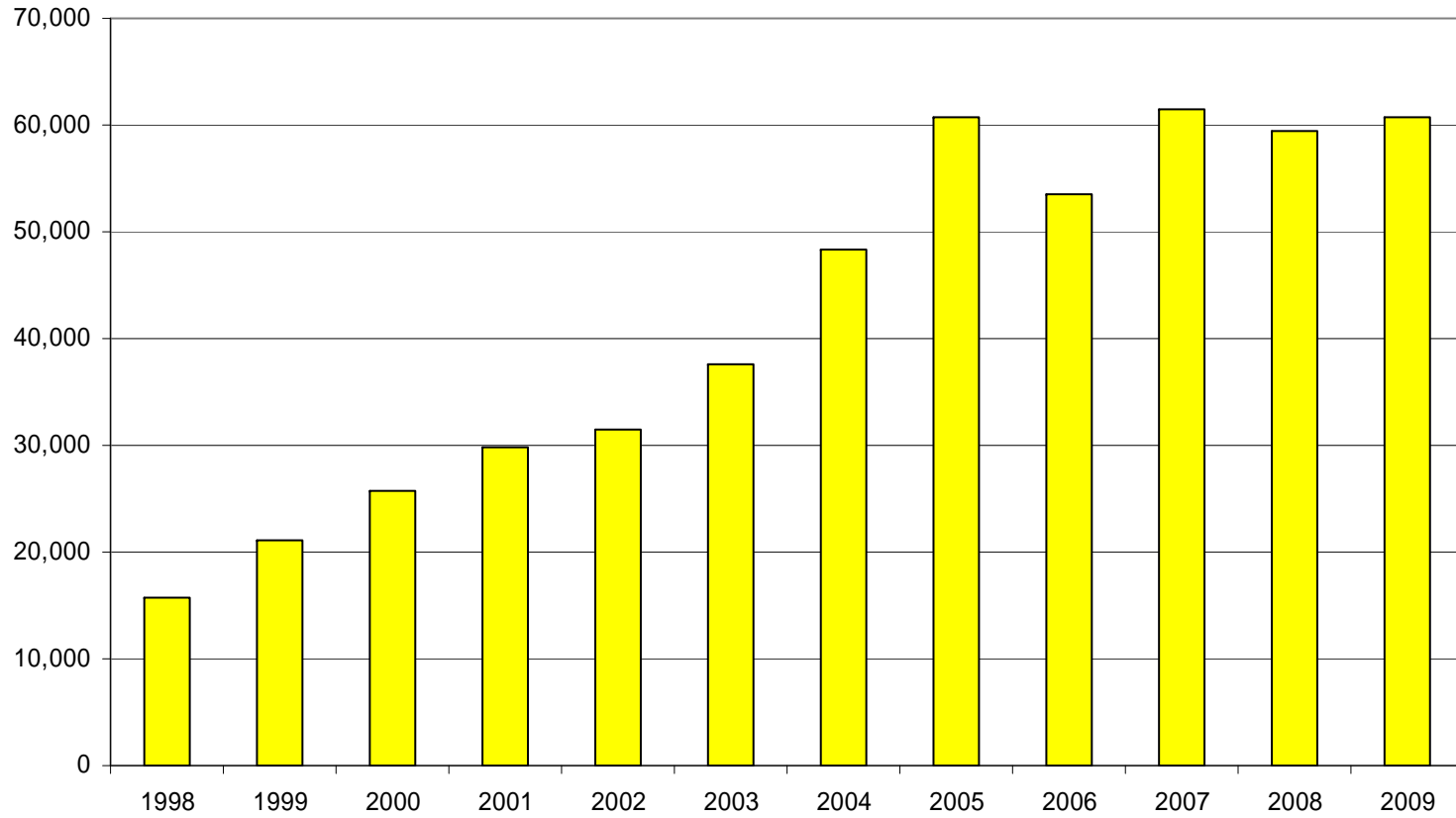

Library Check Outs Year-end 1997-2008 Compared to Second Quarter 2009



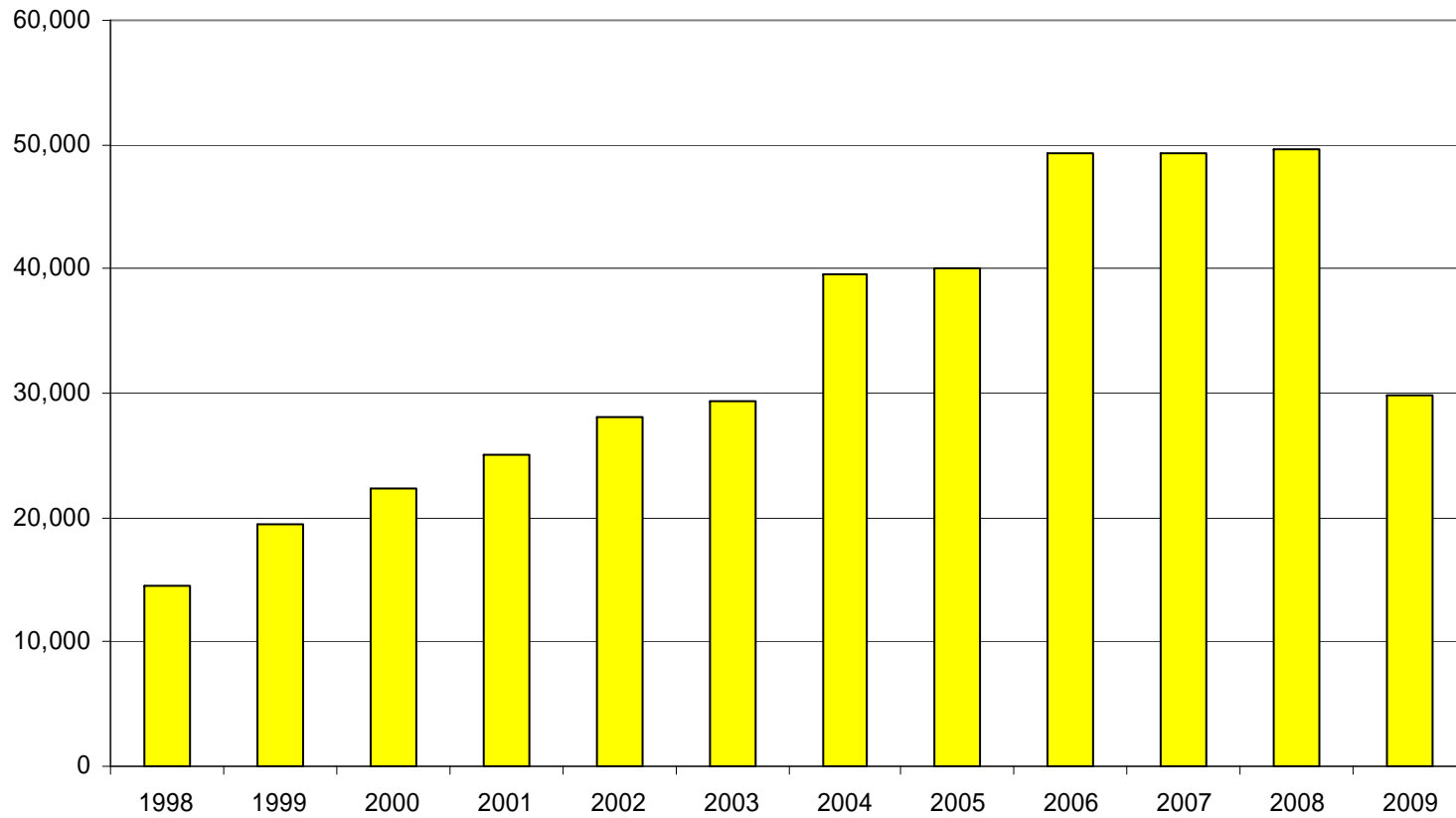

Library Card Holders Year-end 1998-2008 Compared to Second Quarter 2009



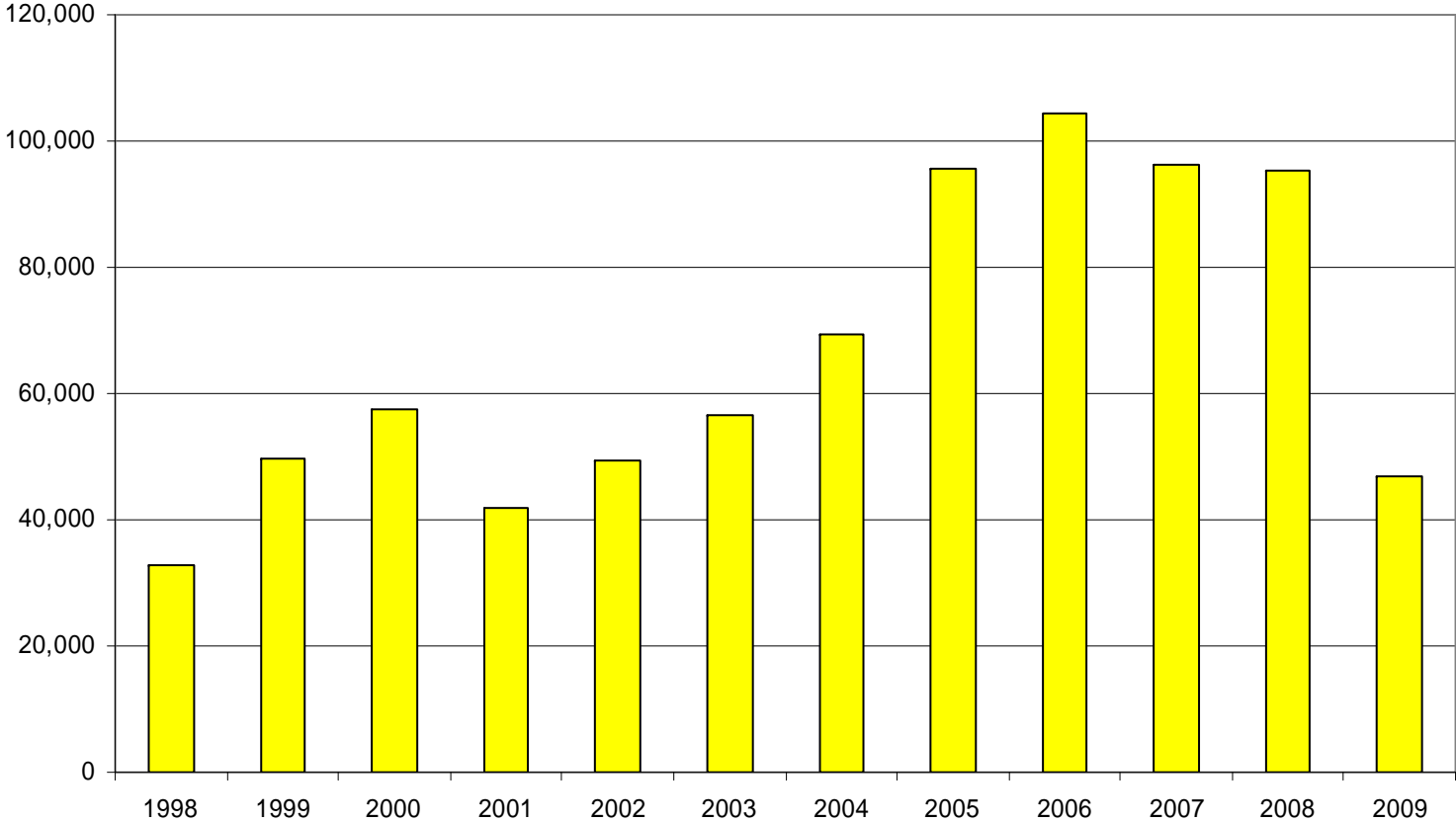

Library Program Attendees Year-end 1998-2008 Compared to Second Quarter 2009



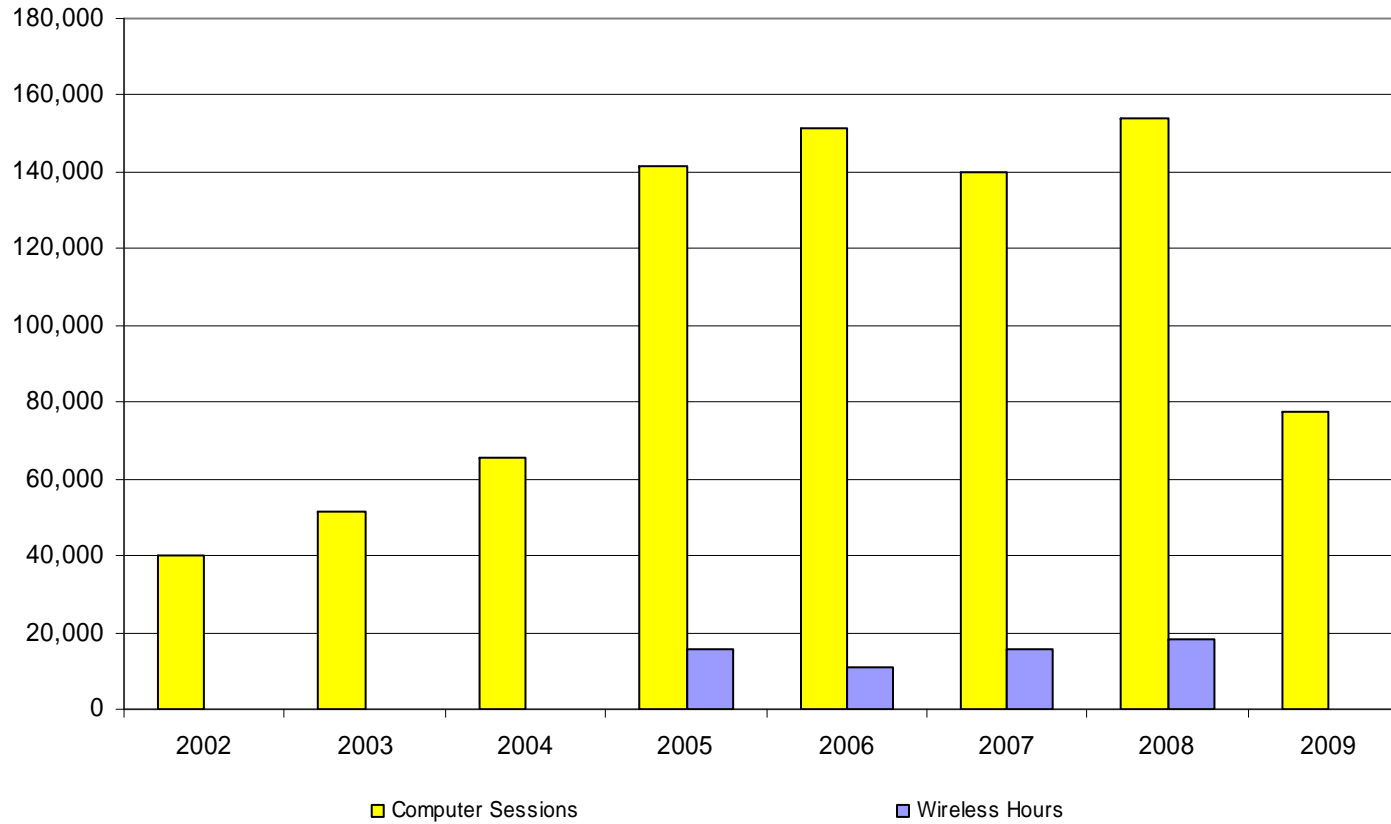

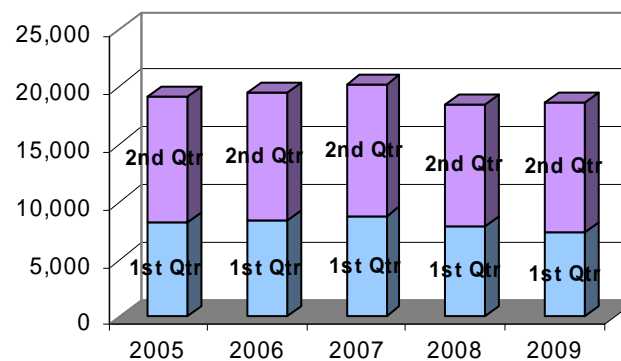

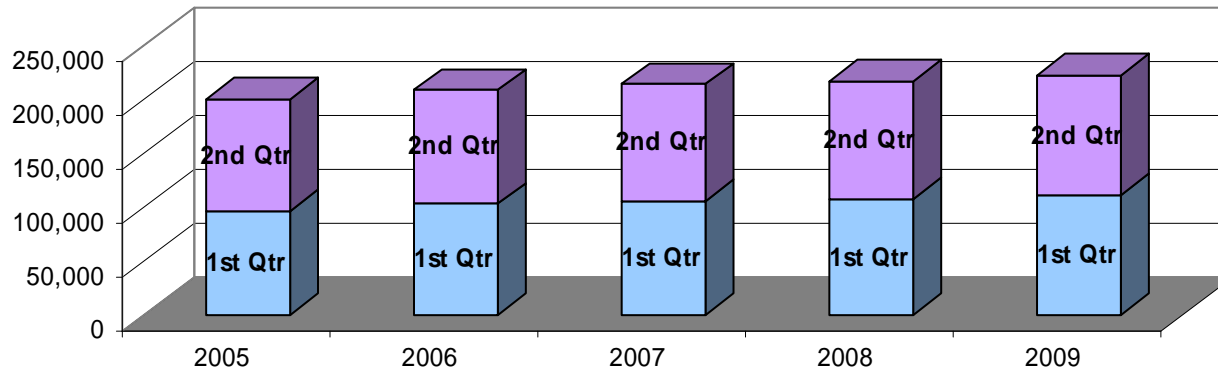


Total Service Orders Processed

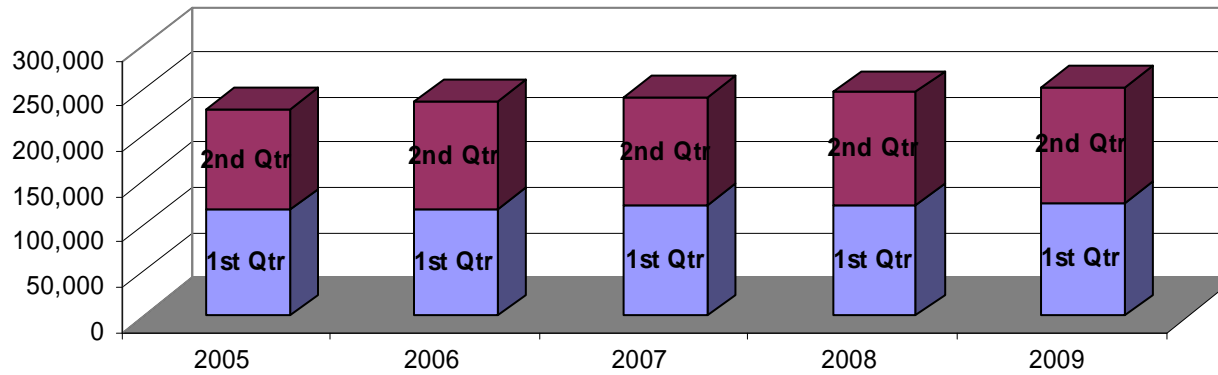

Utility Bills Processed

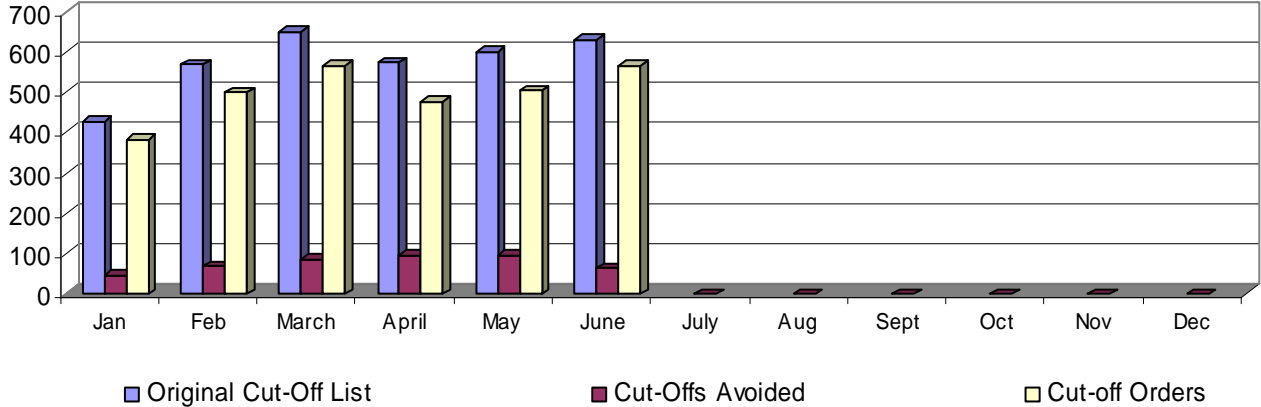


Total Cash Receipts Processed

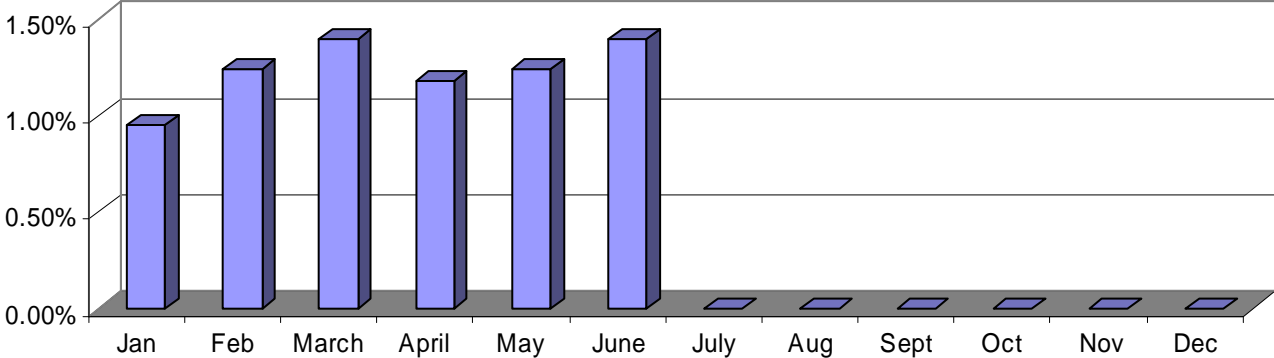

Cut-Offs by Month

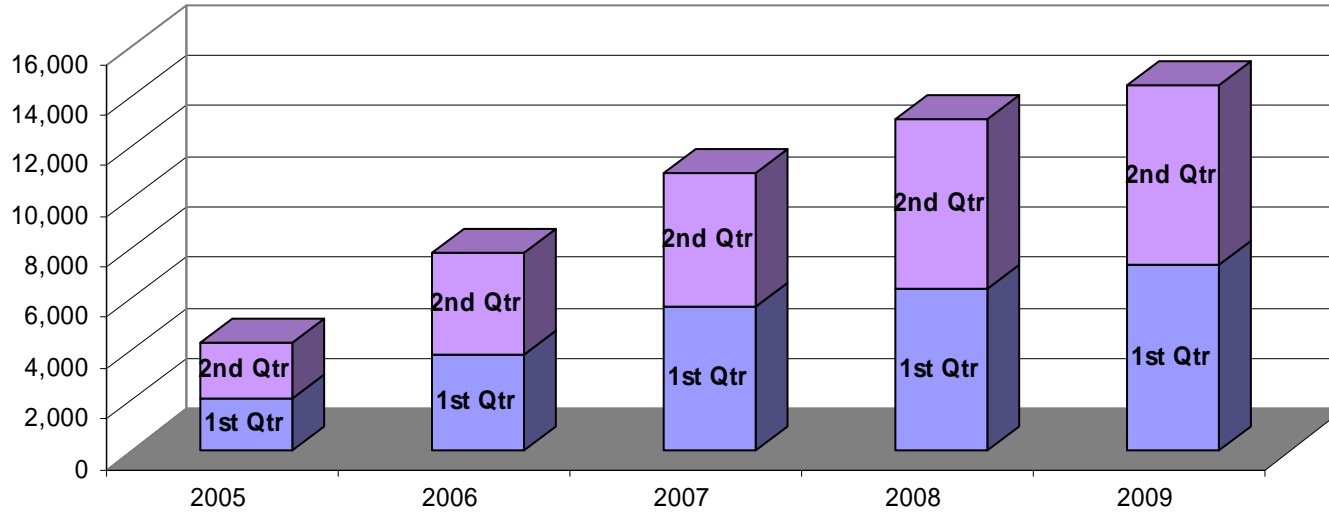


Percent of Customers Cut-Off



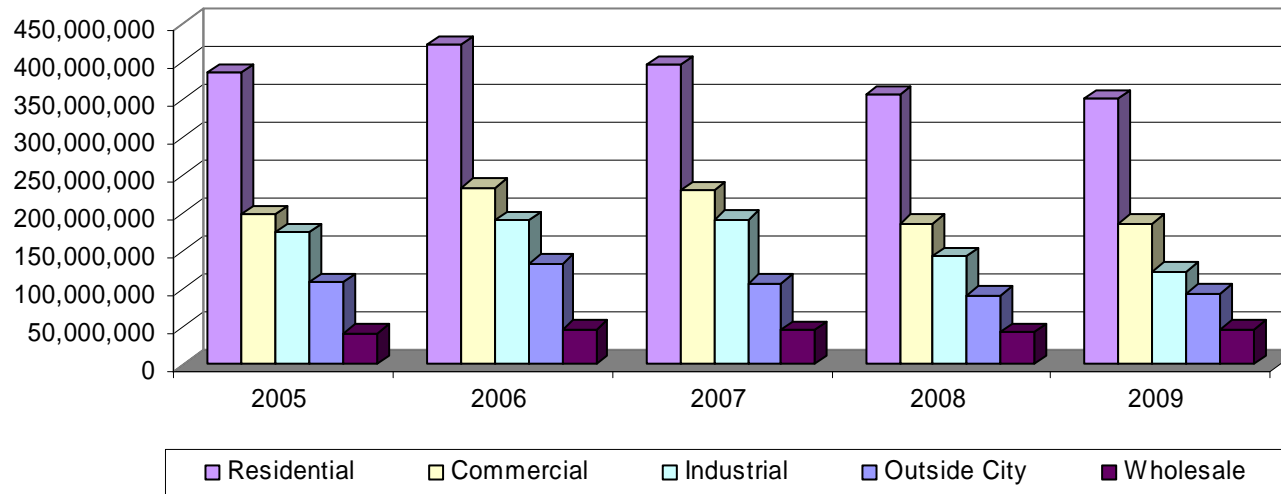

Web Payments Processed



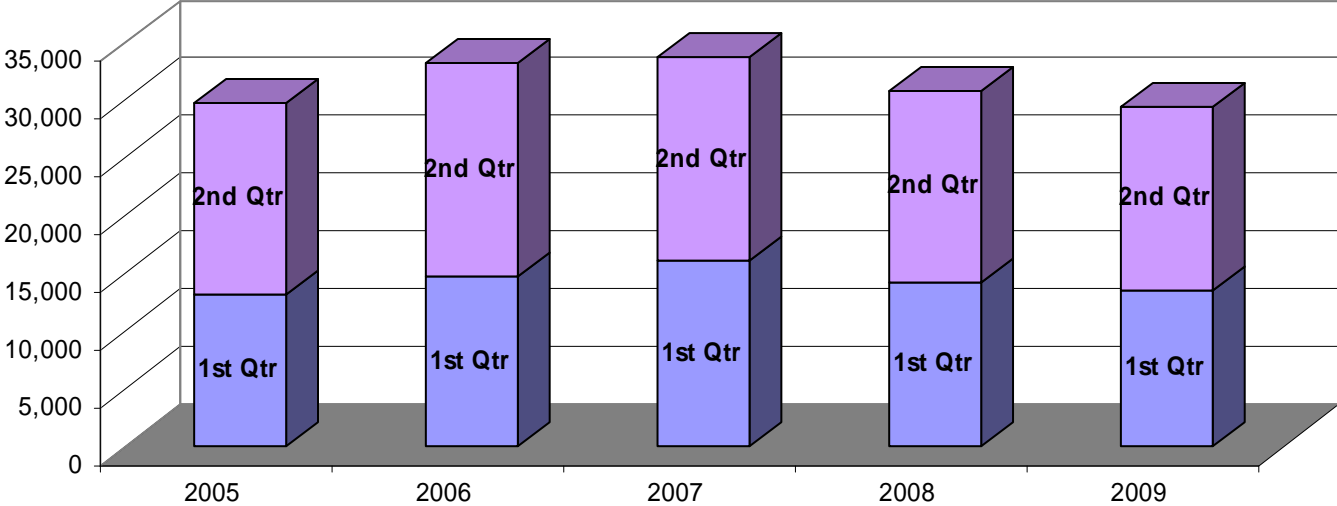

Total Call Center Calls

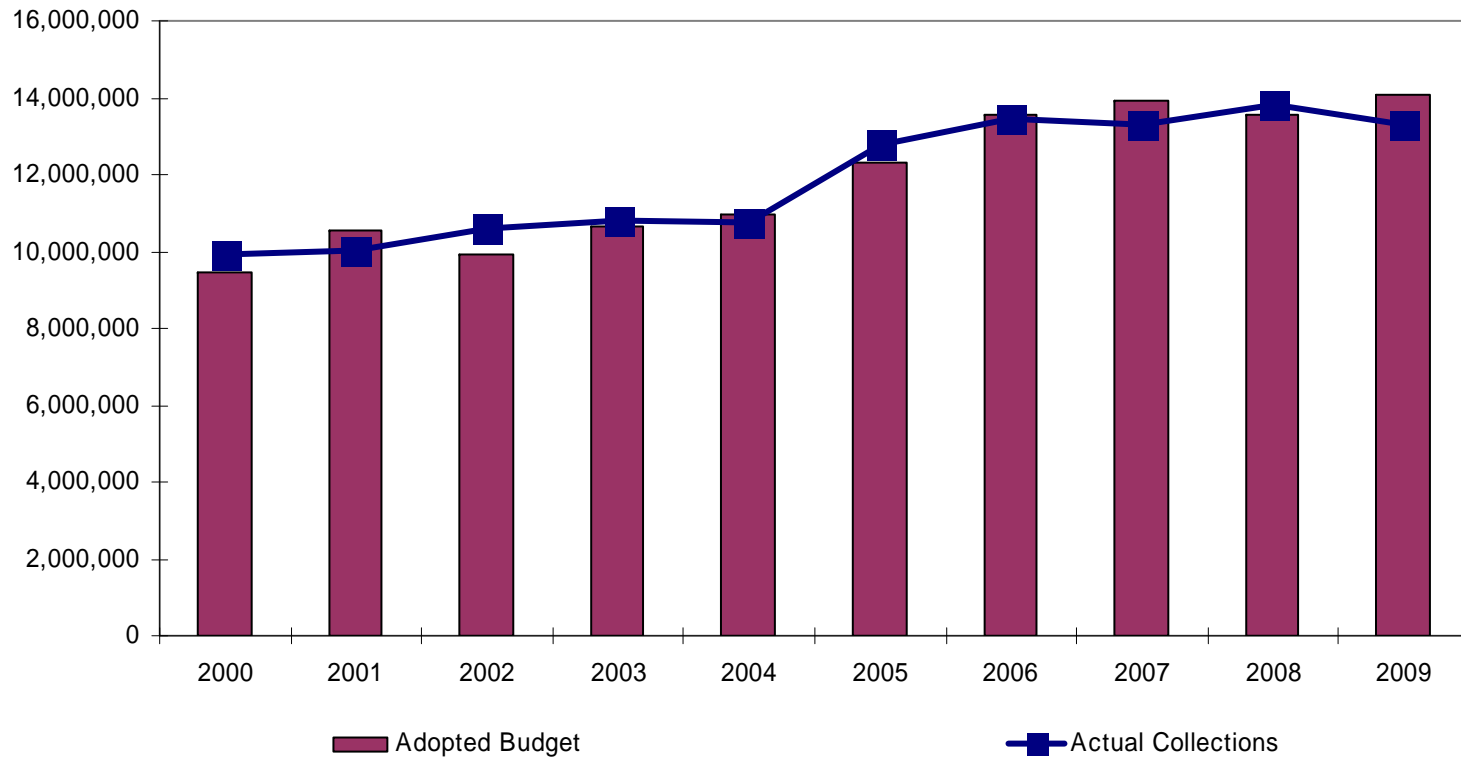

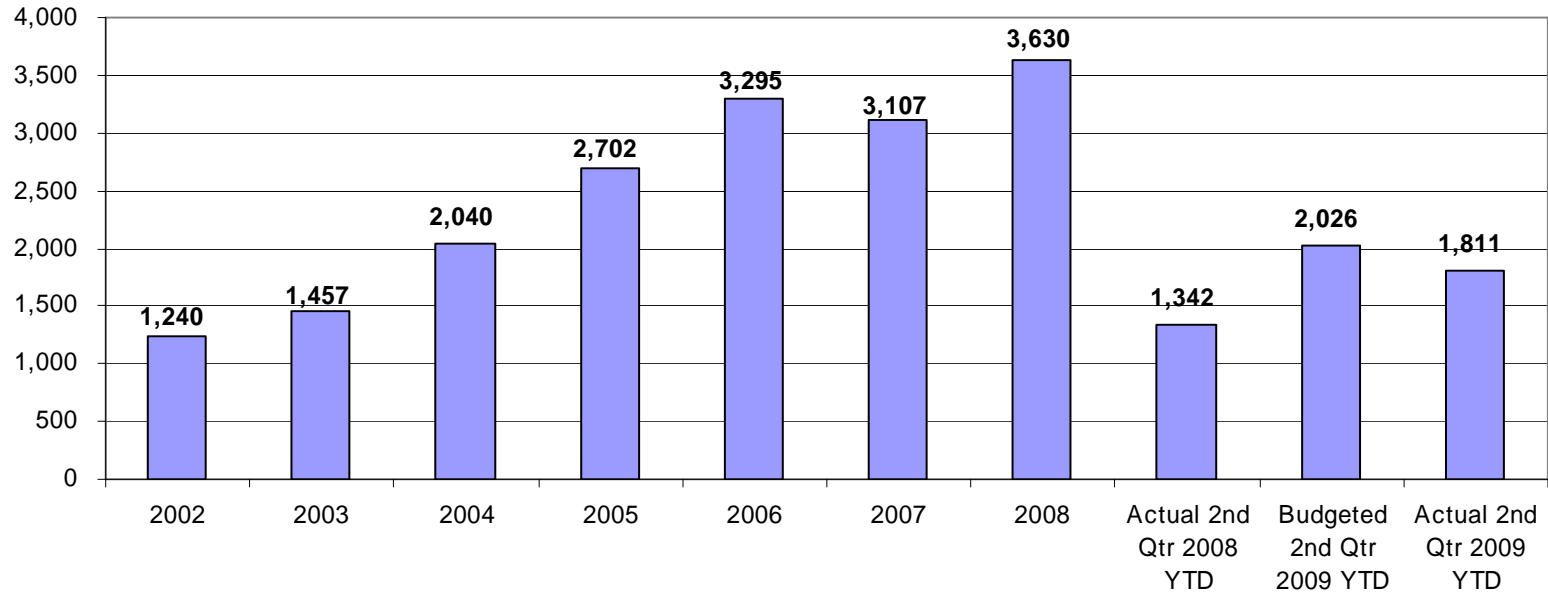
2009 Adopted Budgeted Revenues Compared to Actual Collections for the City and County Sales Taxes

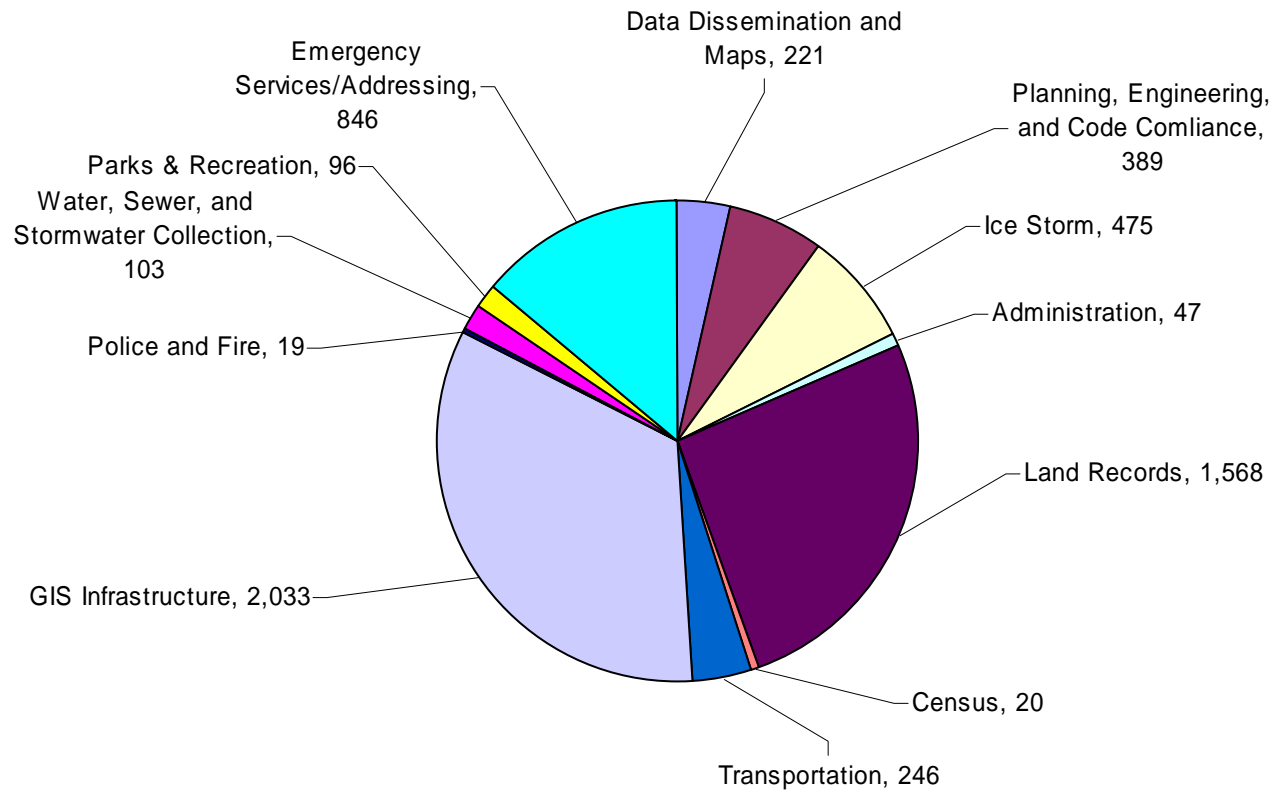

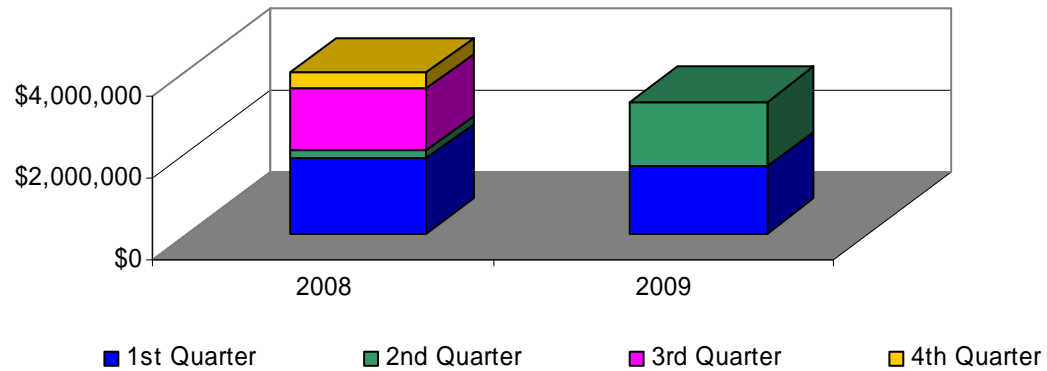

Difference Between Low Bid & Average of Other Bids Received

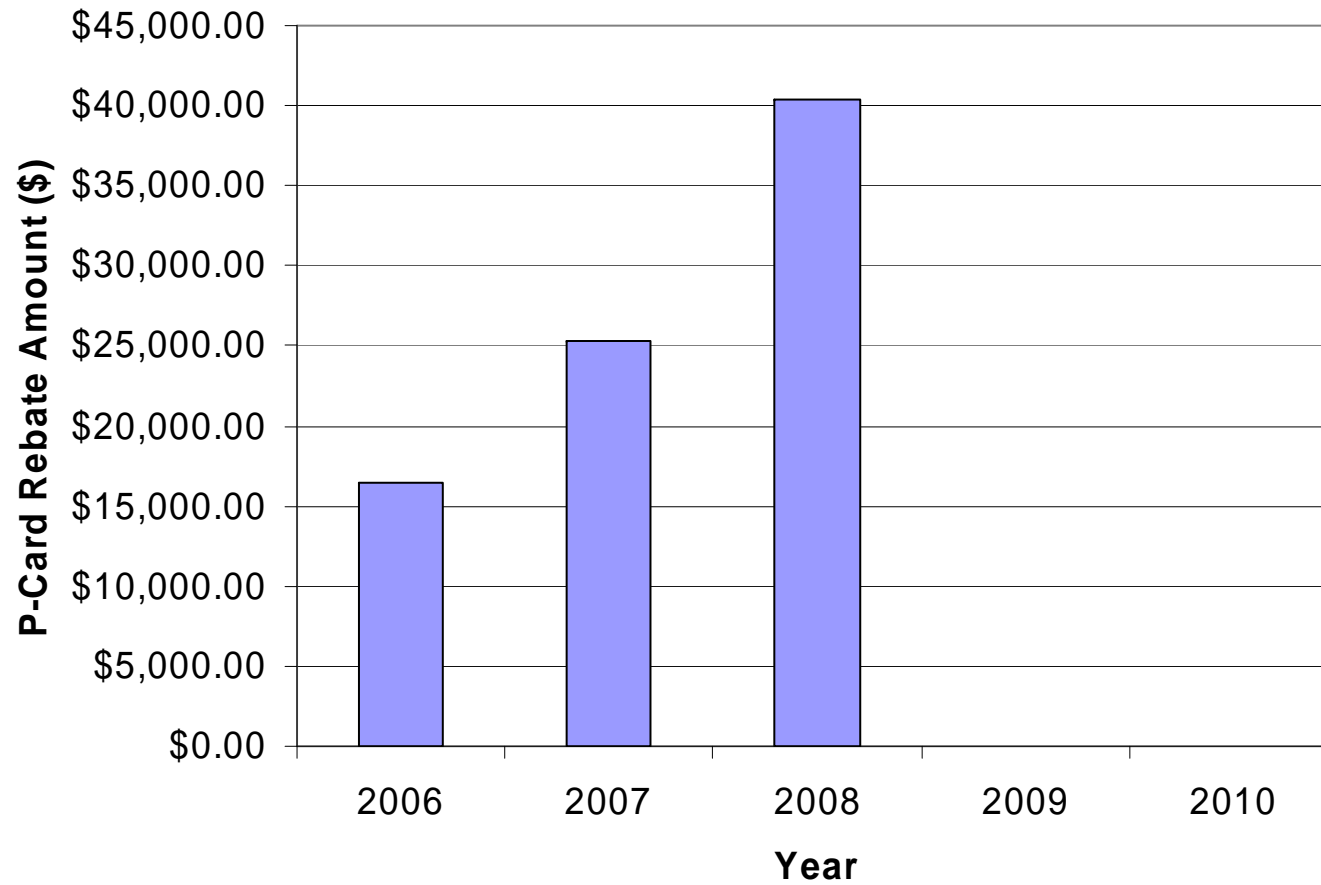


Bid Cost Savings - 2008 vs. 2009



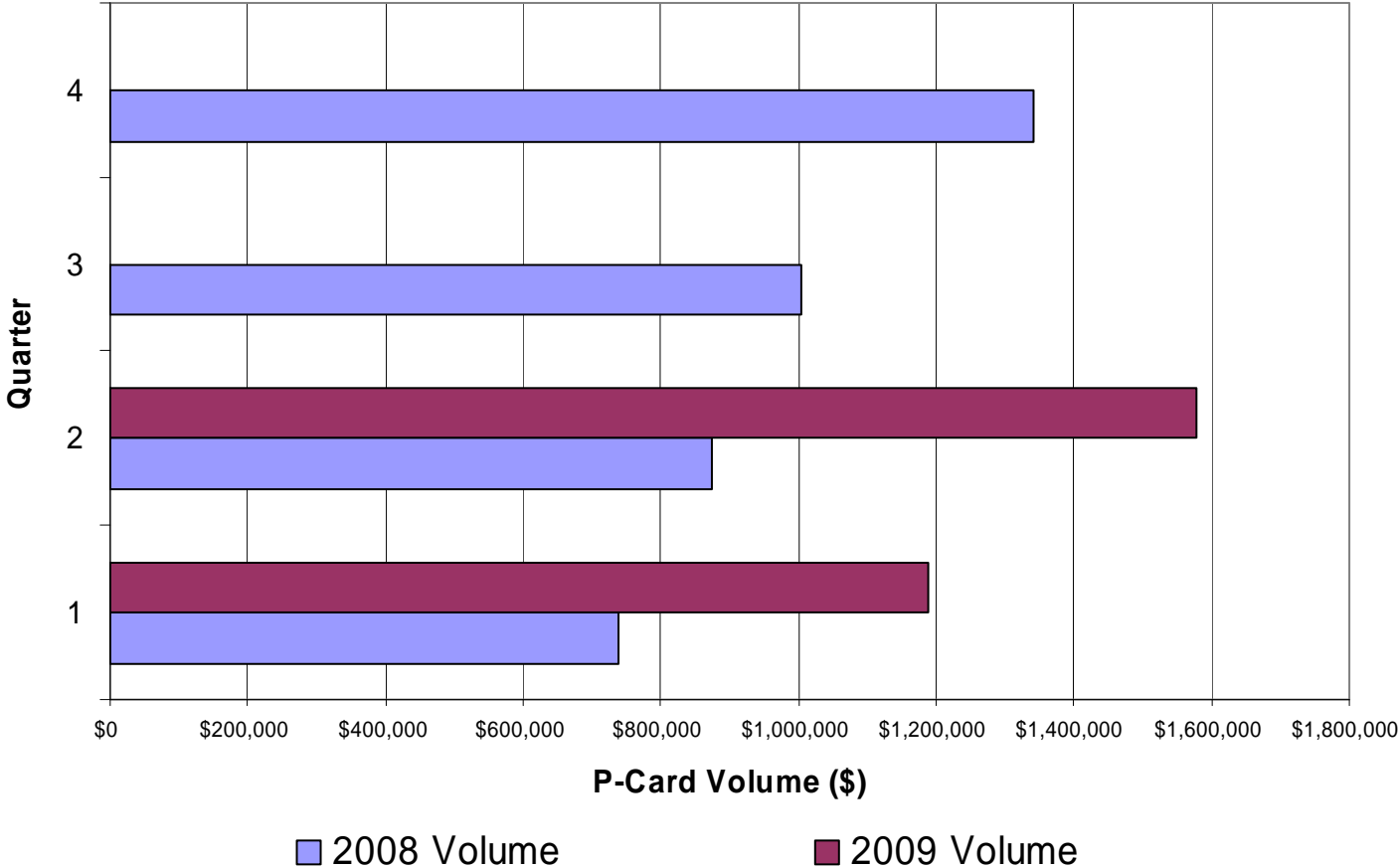

2009 Year-to-Date Revenue - Parking Management Revenue Type and % of Total

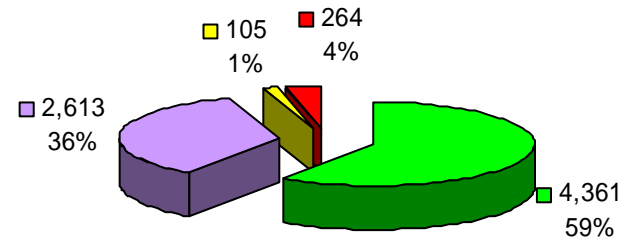
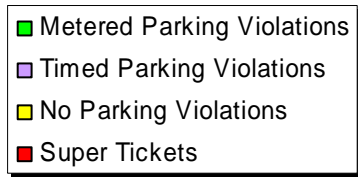

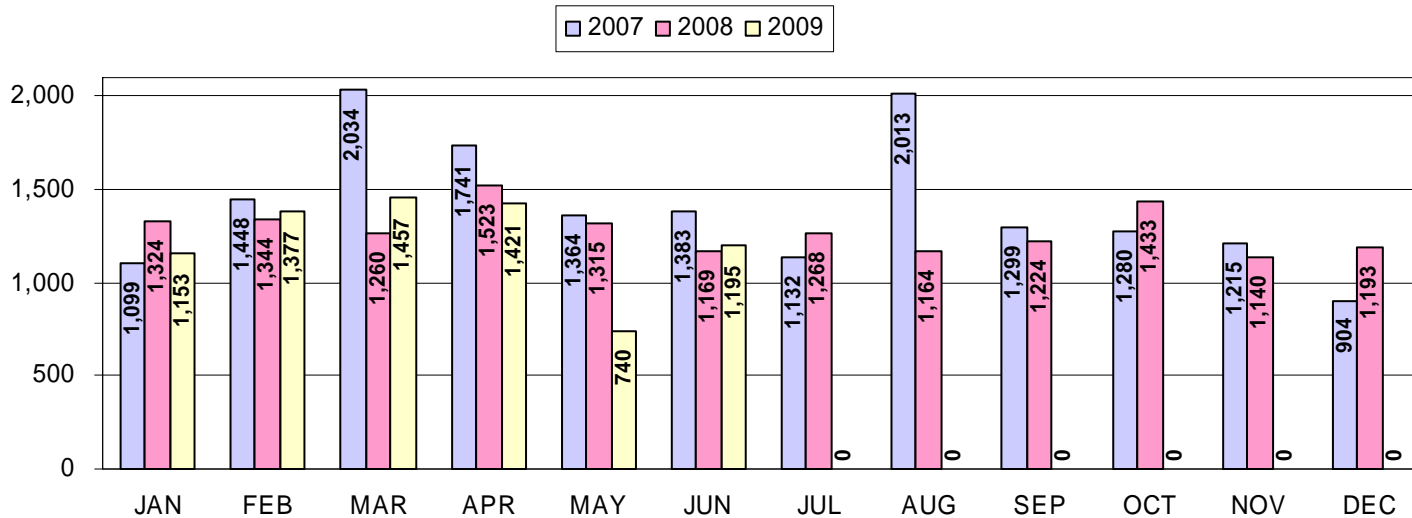

2009 Year-to-Date Citations - Parking Management Citation Type and % of Total

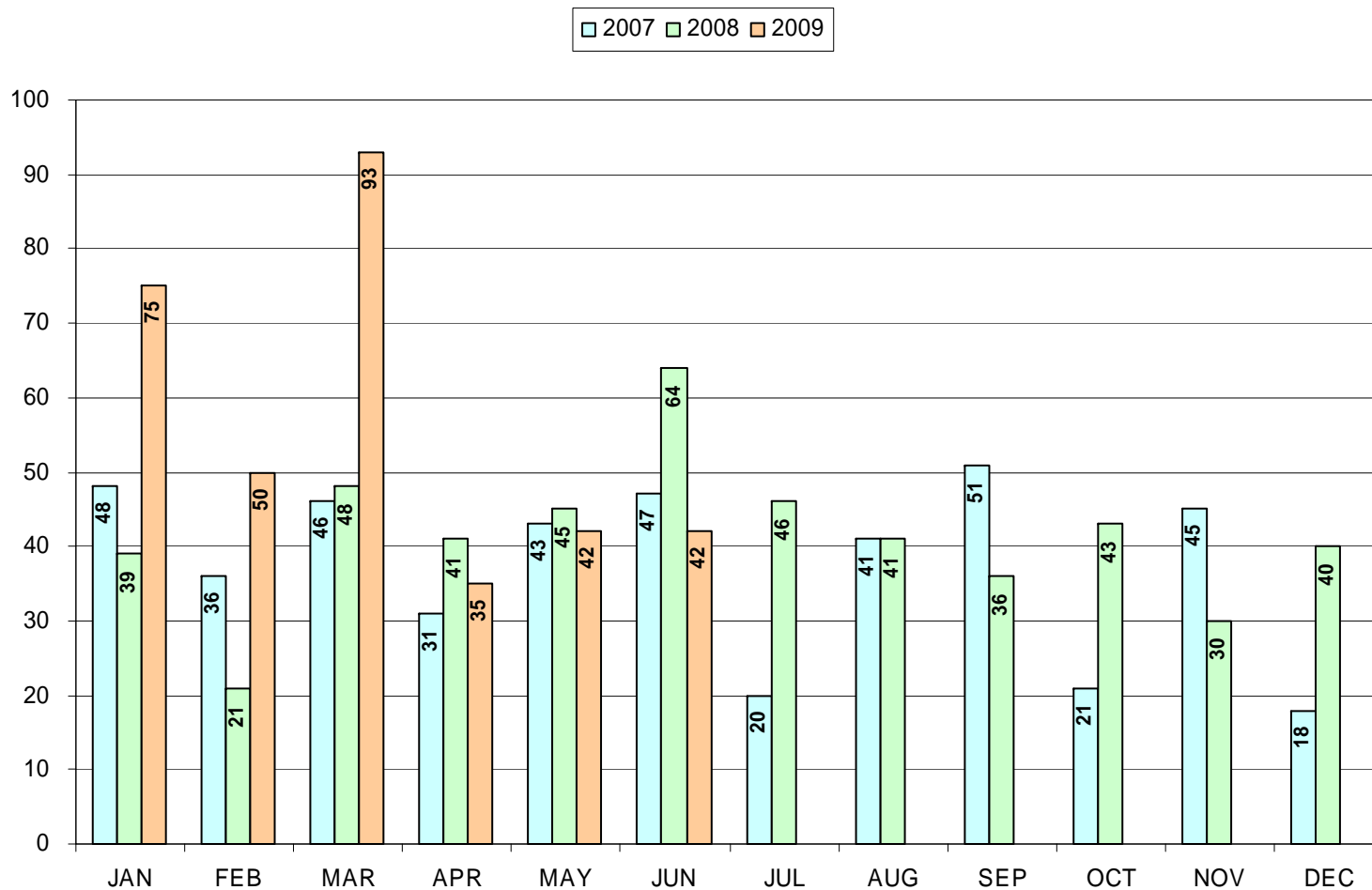

2009 Tonnage, Percentage of Waste Stream, and Revenues by Programs

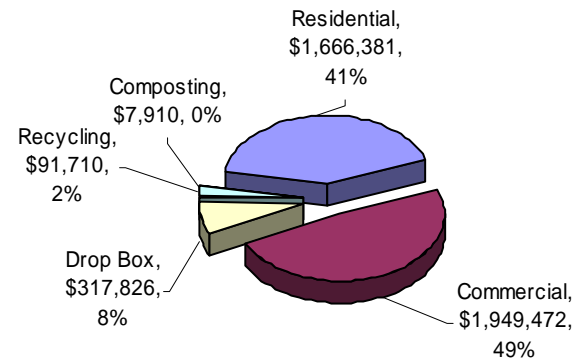
Tonnage by Program 2009 Year-to-Date

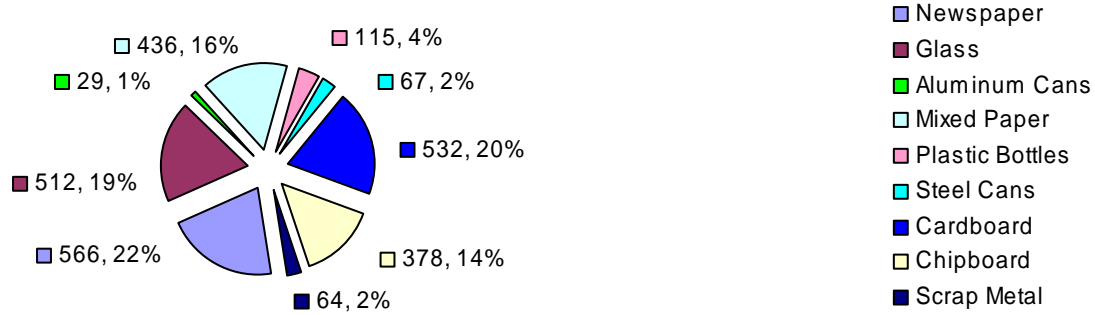


Program Revenues 2009 Year to Date

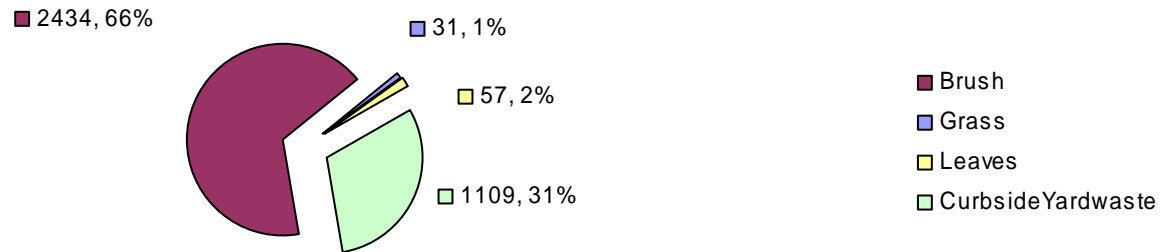

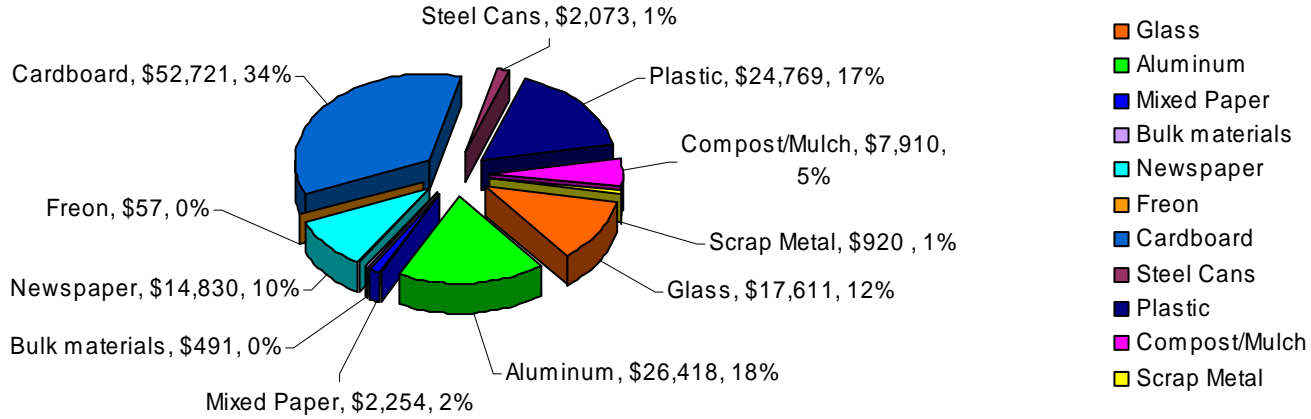

Yardwaste Collected by Tonnage and Percentage

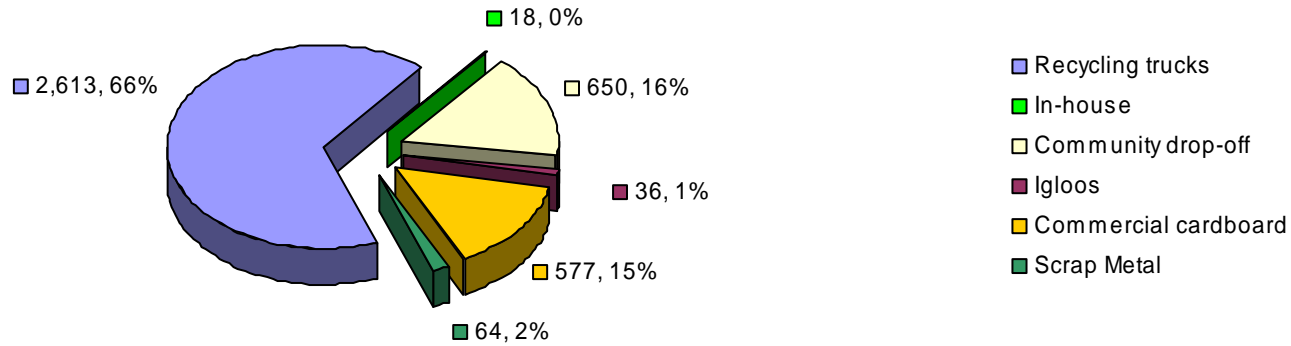

2009 Recycling Revenue and Percent



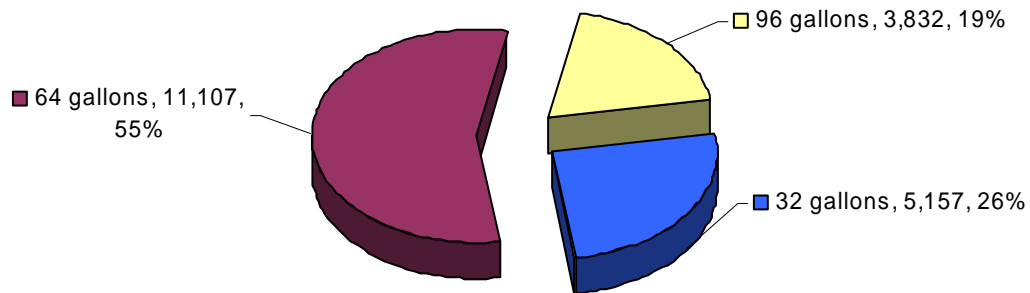
2009 Recycling Collections - Tons and Percentages



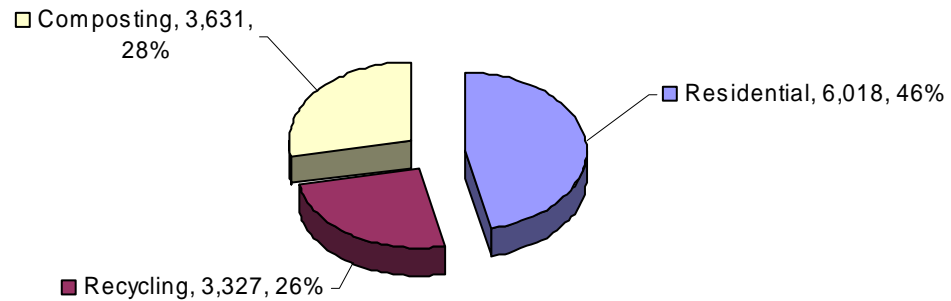

Residential Pay-As-You-Throw Cart Count and Percentage

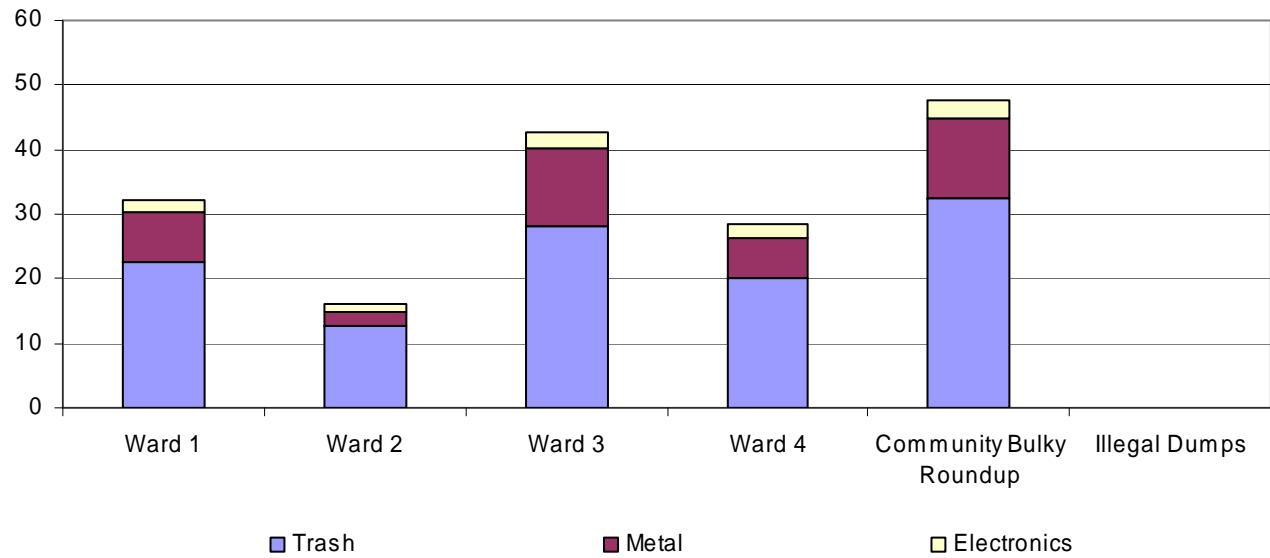


2009 Residential Waste Stream Tons and Diversion

Water & Wastewater Overview

David Jurgens, P. E., Director

- 1) WSIP. Progress continues on biosolids design, Owl Creek Basin design, east side line work, Noland WWTP restorations, and Farmington collection system work.
- 2) Integrated Water/Wastewater Master Plans.
 - a) The Water Master Water Plan and Study for the water storage and distribution system final contract amendment has been awarded to McGoodwin, Williams and Yates. The model and resulting study should be completed in late summer, 2009, and will then be provided in full to the City for in-house execution.
 - b) The Wastewater Master Plan Update is being developed by staff and should be complete late 2009.
 - c) Staff continues to use the updated sewer collection model to evaluate the ability of the system to accommodate flows from new developments.
- 4) Water Distribution System and Backflow Prevention System Upgrades. The Backflow Prevention Ordinance was approved by the Water/Sewer Committee and will be presented to the City Council for approval in mid 2009. Final comments are expected back from the Arkansas Department of Health in July. It should be adopted in 2009. Physical improvements to the City's backflow protection are continuing. Priority was on the University of Arkansas system, which is not complete. Water distribution system upgrades are underway using in-house crews and development cost shares.
- 5) The Mt. Sequoyah Water/Sewer System Upgrade project construction has been awarded and should be complete in the fall of 2009.
- 6) Sanitary Sewer Rehabilitation Projects
 - a) The Sanitary Sewer Rehabilitation project for Illinois River Basin 23 is complete. The project used approximately \$1 million in State Tribal and Assistance Grants (STAG) for 2005.
 - b) The 2009 term contract with Insituform, Inc, work should be executed in August – October, 2009.
 - b) The RJN Group, Inc. completed a sanitary sewer evaluation study in the southern portion of Fayetteville and Greenland. The report is in staff review. Design is underway. Cured in place lines will be combined with the 2009 CIPP term contract.
- 7) 36" Water Transmission Line. The project is underway to install the flow isolation and pressure sustaining valves. The work is substantially complete. Final adjustments to this complicated hardware will be made in the summer of 2009.
- 8) Highway 265 Water/Sewer Relocation and 36" Water Transmission Line. Phase I, the 36" line on Township between Crossover and Old Wire, is under contract to Seven Valleys Construction. The rest of this project is in design by McClelland Consulting Engineers. The revenue bond is approved.
- 9) Canterbury Water Tank. Design is underway for the tank, connecting lines to the tank, and the pump station.
- 10) Solid Waste Floor. Concrete repair is complete.

Water & Sewer Maintenance

Sewer department employees installed 1,036 feet of 8" pipe. The improvements were in the vicinity of Cambell, Duncan, Horn and Hill St. The sewer department T.V inspected 10.24 miles of sewer main, washed 57.9 miles of sewer main, repaired 30 sewer point repairs at the main, repaired/rebuilt 12 manholes and had 16 sewer over flows.

Water department employees installed 7,352 feet of water pipe. Locations of the improvements were Township, Razorback, Lundsford, Hammond, Dinesmore, Rock St, Lafayette. Repaired/ replaced 11 hydrants within the water system. Employees also repaired 62 leaks and provided customer service in the form of locates to 2,517 persons

Meter Operations

Meter reading and maintenance employees worked 5,146 turn on/off orders, 47 pressure and leak related orders, and 842 miscellaneous customer service related jobs. Field reps inspected 21 construction accounts to determine if the buildings were occupied or still under construction and verified 190 water taps to ensure that the tap and meter are serving the building to which they were issued. Updated 4 construction accounts pertaining to customer status and billing charges. Installed 263 radio-read meters for new and existing service and installed and installed 45 manual read meters. These installations increase the number of meters that are radio-read to 14,036. Replaced 34 manual read meters that were due for scheduled maintenance or had malfunctioned and removed 20 water meters reported to be inactive and no longer needed at the address. They assigned 232 utility account numbers and location codes, rebuilt 324 meters, tested 843 meters for inventory and change out. The backflow department surveyed 80 high and low hazard locations. Reviewed seven building plans.

Wastewater Treatment

From April to June 2009, both wastewater treatment plants (WWTPs) continued to produce final effluent far better than the NPDES permit limits require. Discharge from the facility was 100% in compliance with the NPDES permit for the 2nd quarter of 2009. The effluents from Noland and West Side WWTPs also passed biomonitoring requirements on both Pimephales promelas (fathead minnow) and Ceriodaphnia dubia (water flea) for the 2nd quarter of 2009.

Hay commitments were taken on April 1st by OMI staff with Andrea Foren (from Purchasing) present as an observer. Twelve customers made the commitment list this year for the estimated 1460 tons, which was 60% of our 5 year average hay production. Twenty three people were placed on the standby list for a total of over 4185 tons requested.

Billy Ammons, OMI Regional Business Manager, and Rob Kuta, OMI Regional Vice President, presented the 2008 OMI annual update at the City Council Agenda session on 12 May. A contract rebate check in the amount of \$245,582.50 was delivered to the City on 16 May. Annual reports were also provided to the Mayor, City Council members, and City Clerk.

OMI staff also completed the salvaging of equipment from the decommissioned lift stations. The salvaged equipment is warehoused at the Noland WWTP. Scrap metal and electrical wire from various pieces of decommissioned equipment was sold for a total of \$17,197.80. Checks were submitted to Water & Sewer.

The Renewal Industrial Stormwater General Permit has been issued with the effective date of 1 July. The City has until 31 December to submit the Notice of Intent to renew the coverage under this general permit for both wastewater treatment plants.

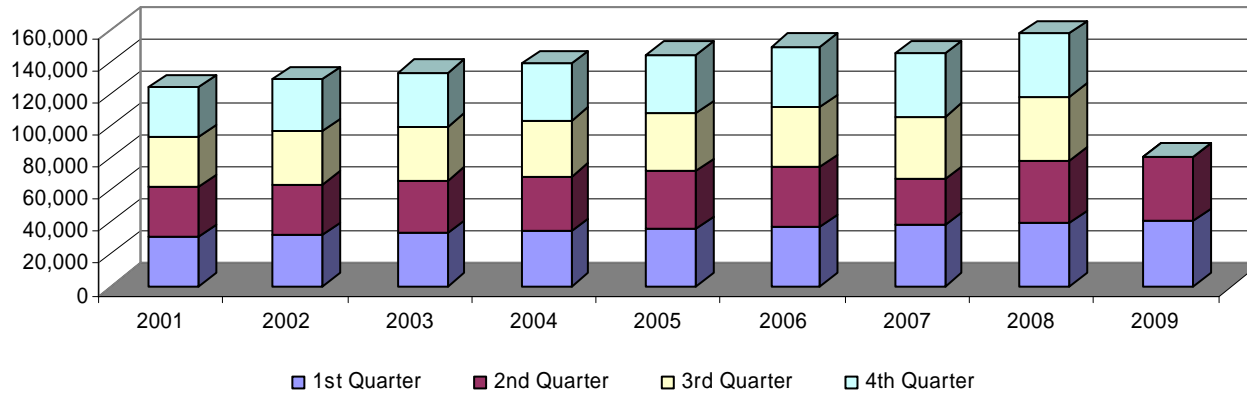
Mike Ross, CH2M HILL OMI Regional Technical Specialist, conducted a Class I Wastewater Class from 8 to 10 June at the West Side Wastewater Treatment Plant. Sixteen wastewater operators from the Northwest area attended the training. Five OMI employees passed the certification exam and received their Wastewater licenses at the end of the class.

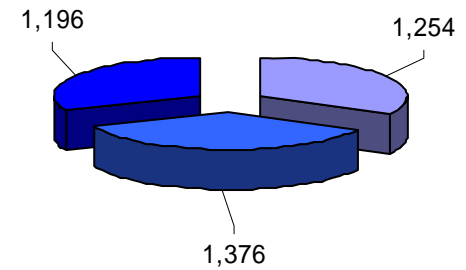
Police Calls for Service



Fire Calls for Service

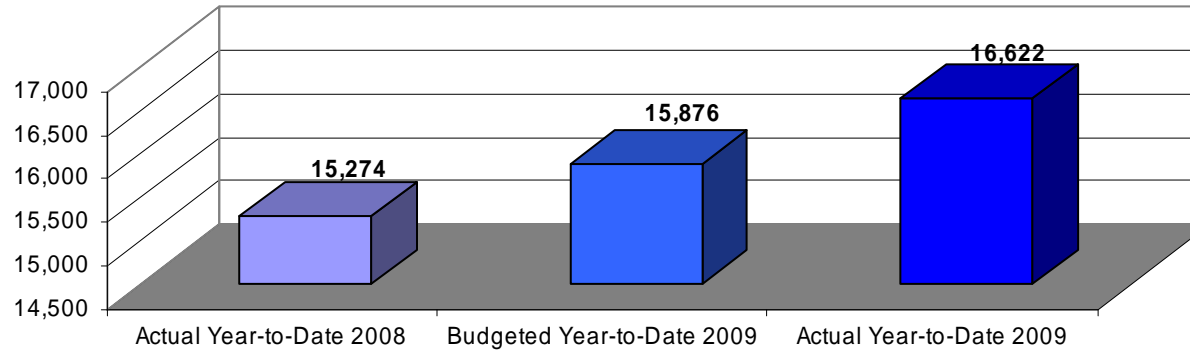

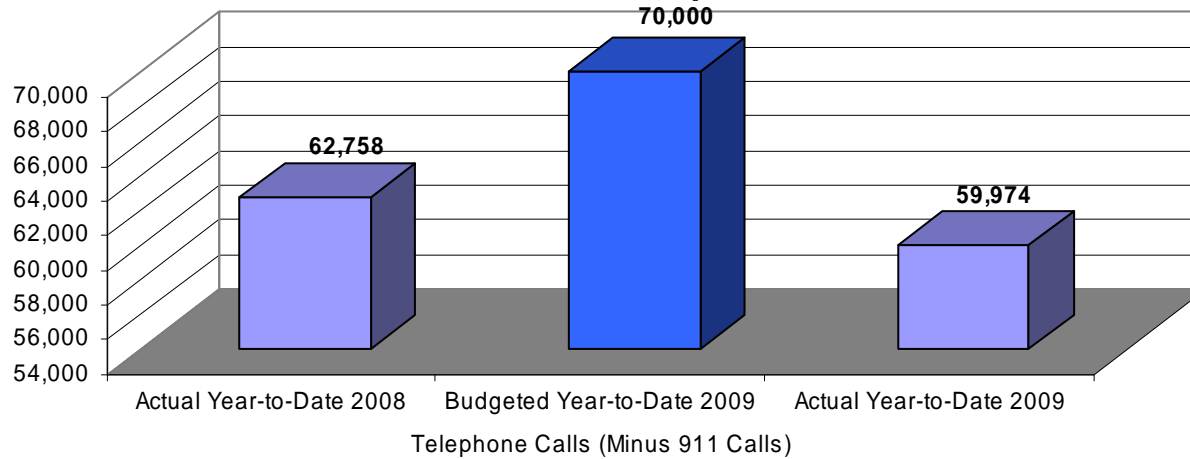

Fayetteville 911 Calls



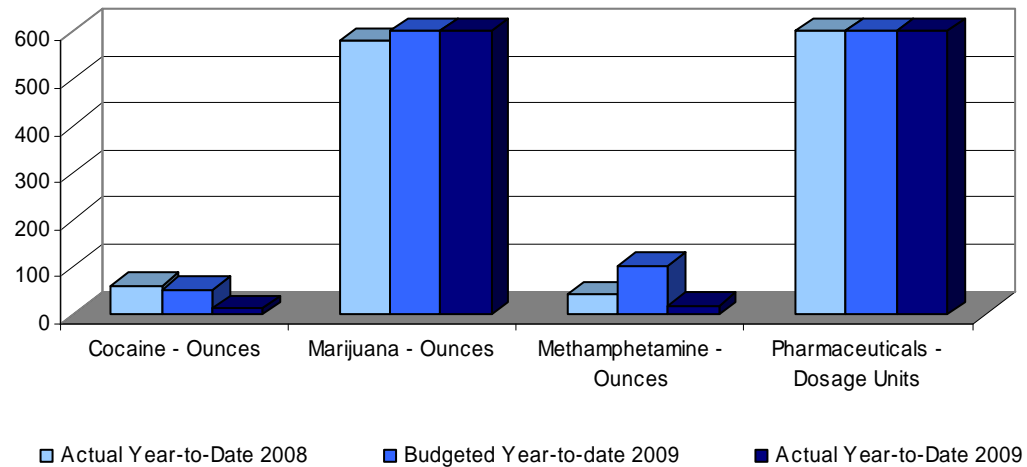

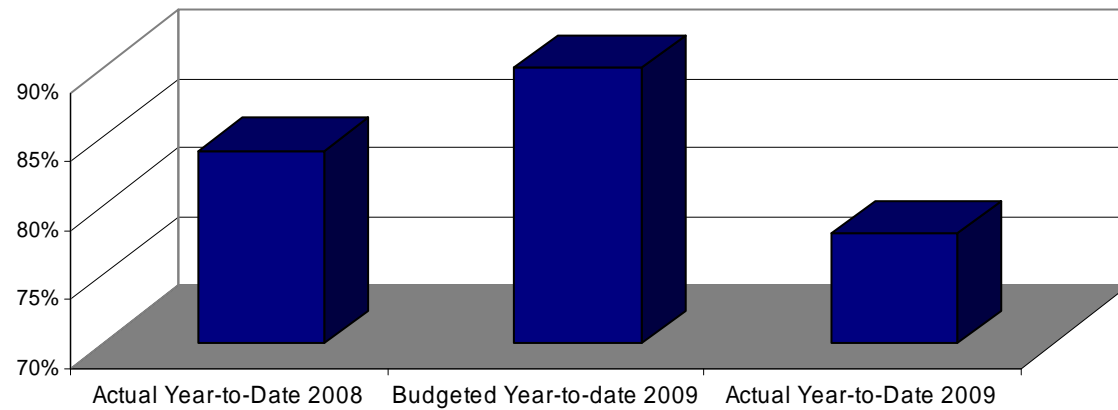

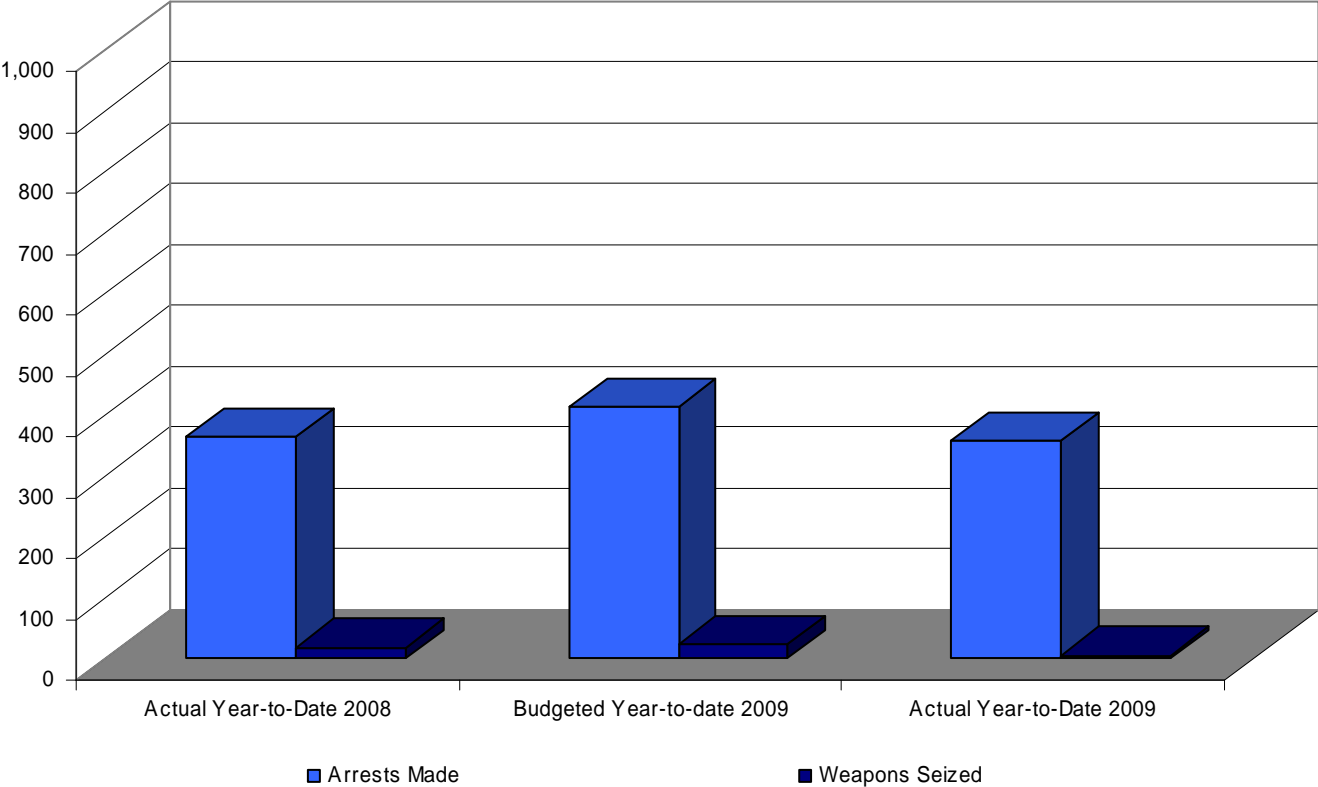


Drug Enforcement Case Clearance Rate

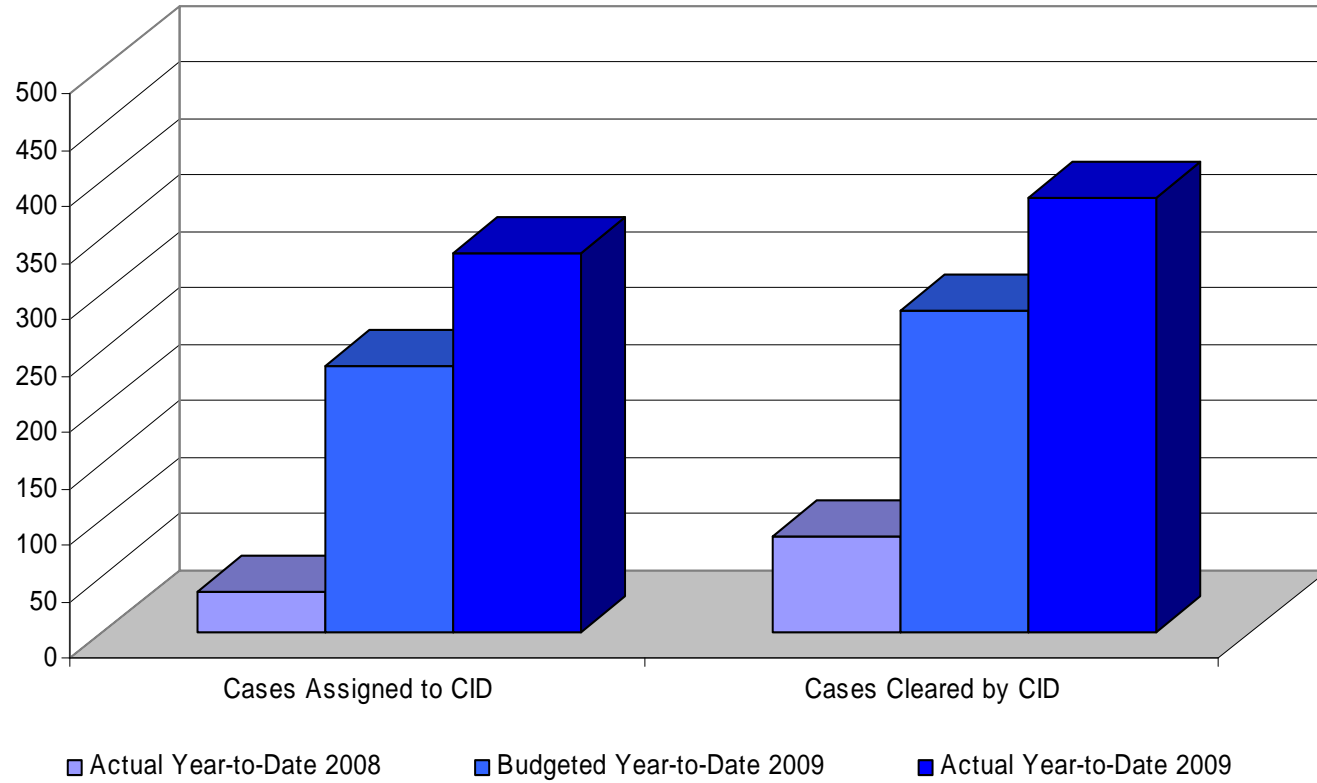

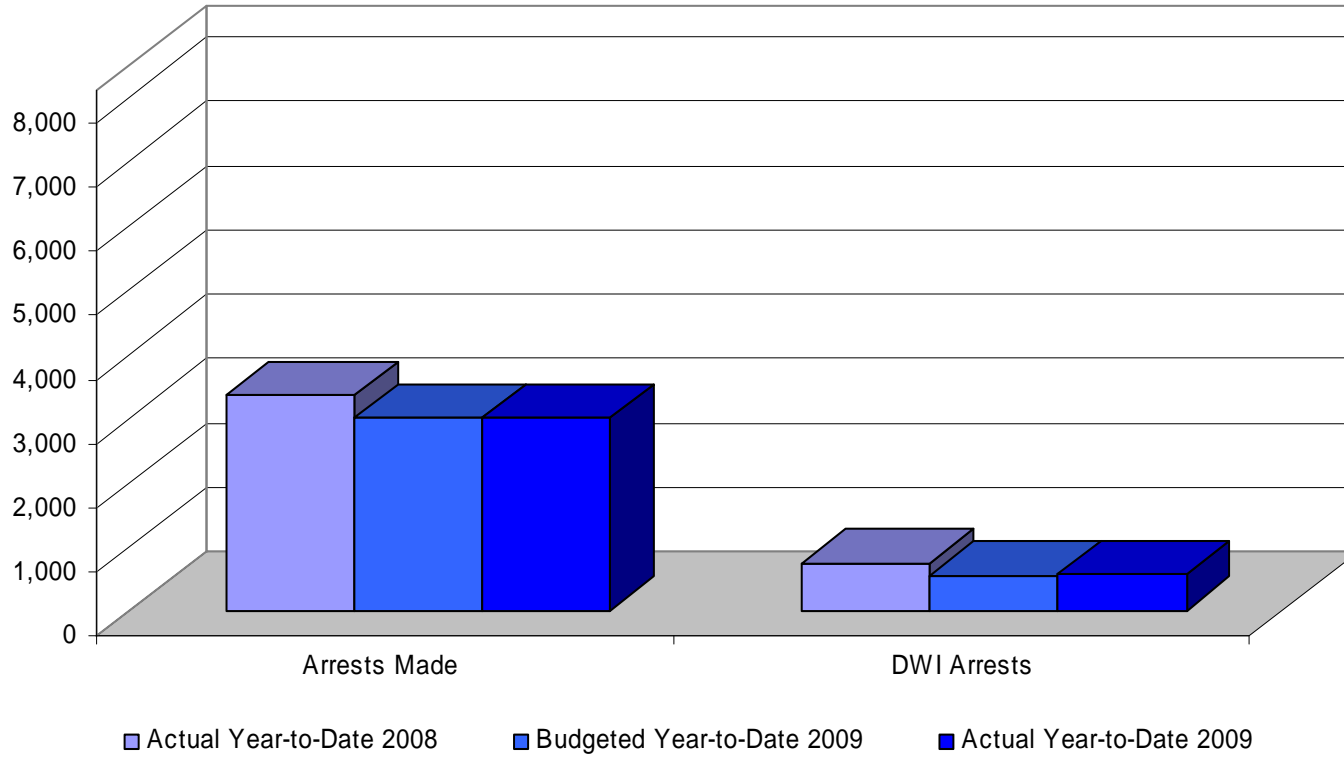

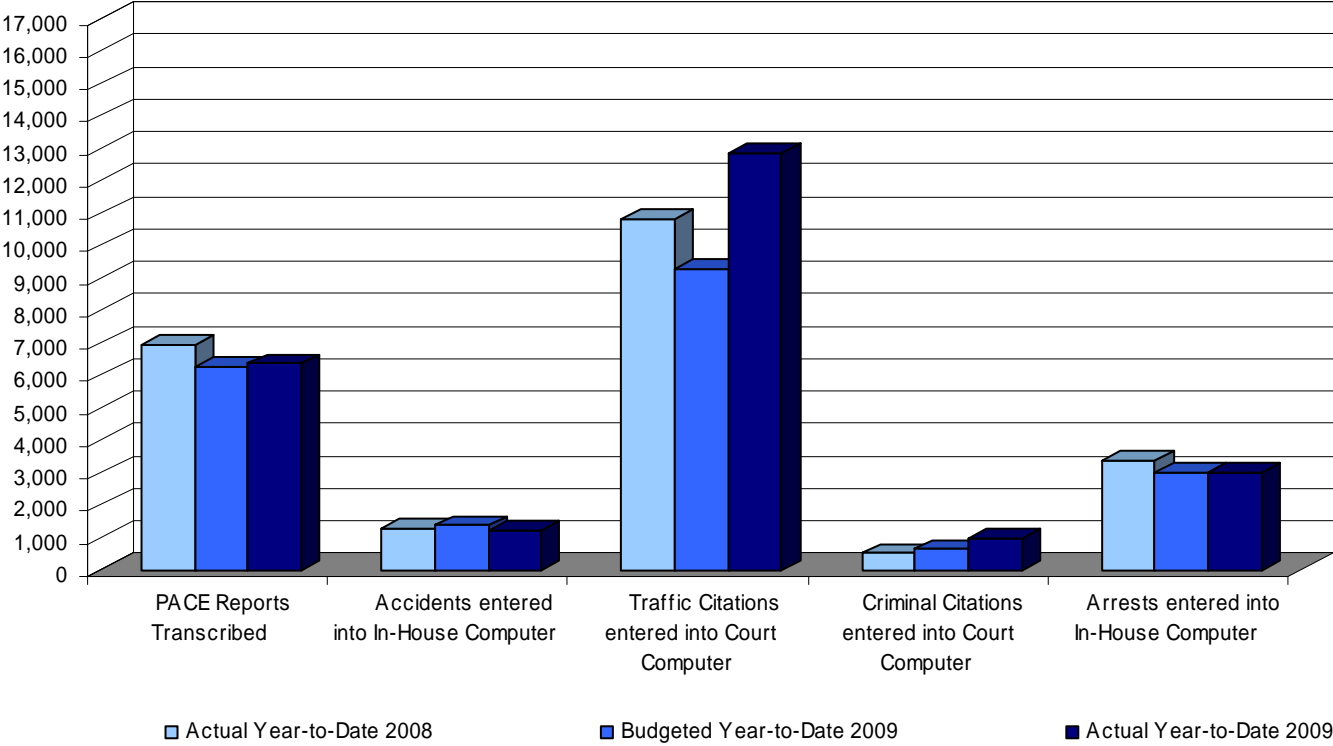
