It has been my annual honor to award the Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Brotherhood Award to a City Employee nominated by his or her peers as the person who best exemplifies Dr. King's message of equality, justice and brotherhood. This year's award winner was nominated by Chief Dayringer and Chief Lynch and has an impressive record of service to the City and to our larger community.

Yesterday, I presented the 2011 City of Fayetteville Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Brotherhood Award to Mauro Campos in front of hundreds of our citizens at the Walton Arts Center parking lot before our march to the University of Arkansas noon vigil. Battalion Chief Mauro Campos has served our City and our citizens for seventeen years. He began as a Firefighter and through diligence, loyalty, competence and hard work has earned promotions until he now is a Battalion Chief in charge of the essential and life saving assignment of Training for the Fayetteville Fire Department.

Not only has Battalion Chief Campos ably served our City as a firefighter, he has also served Fayetteville as a community volunteer and educator. Chief Campos received an award for this community service from the Fayetteville Fire Department in 2003. The American Red Cross recognized Chief Campos in 2004

and presented him the Community Hero Award for his efforts in community education.

Chief Campos was instrumental in starting the Fayetteville Fire Department's Fire Explorer Program in conjunction with the Boy Scouts of America. He has used his bilingual abilities to teach fire safety to Spanish speaking citizens of Fayetteville. Chief Campos has reached out to other Northwest Arkansas Spanish speaking communities to educate them about fire awareness and safety including a program sponsored by Toyota Motor Corporation in the Springdale School District.

Chief Campos is married with three children and has assisted as a volunteer in his children's athletics.




