



## WATER AND WASTEWATER DEPARTMENT

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Dear Resident:

The Cities of Farmington and Fayetteville have hired Garney Construction to perform sewer construction in your neighborhood and at points in western Fayetteville and Farmington as part of the cities' overall Wastewater System Improvement Project. This work will include construction of approximately 11,133 linear feet of gravity sewer main and 23 manholes along Farmington Branch Creek in Farmington, as shown on the attached map.

Garney personnel will be working 7:00 AM to 7:00 PM, Monday through Friday, and may also work some weekends. In some areas where speed is required to maintain crew and/or public safety and/or keep ground or rain water from damaging their work they may be working continuously, 24 hours a day seven days a week. They will be in yellow logo shirts, white hard hats and their white vehicles are also marked with the company name. They require full access to sewer lines, manholes and easements. They are obligated by contract to get to these facilities, and are doing so at the direction of the cities. Due to the variety of work items and inspections involved, there may be multiple trips to any given location. There may also be subcontractors performing specialized work such as road bores, as well as survey crews marking the exact location of the lines preceding the construction crews. The project will start immediately, and will continue through the end of 2009.

The net result of this work will be to improve the sewer service in Farmington. The new sewer main will carry flows to the West Side Wastewater Treatment Plant, which began operation in late May, 2008.

I apologize in advance for any inconvenience this work may cause, but hope you appreciate the ultimate benefit produced by this work.
